Emailing report cards provides you with instant access to this information and is something the College is beginning to move towards in the future. It is important that your contact details, especially your email address is up to date. Please contact the College Office to amend any details as required.

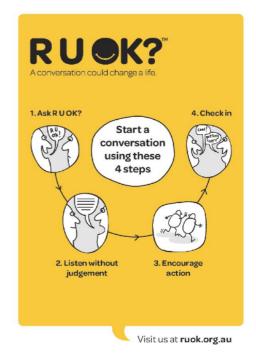

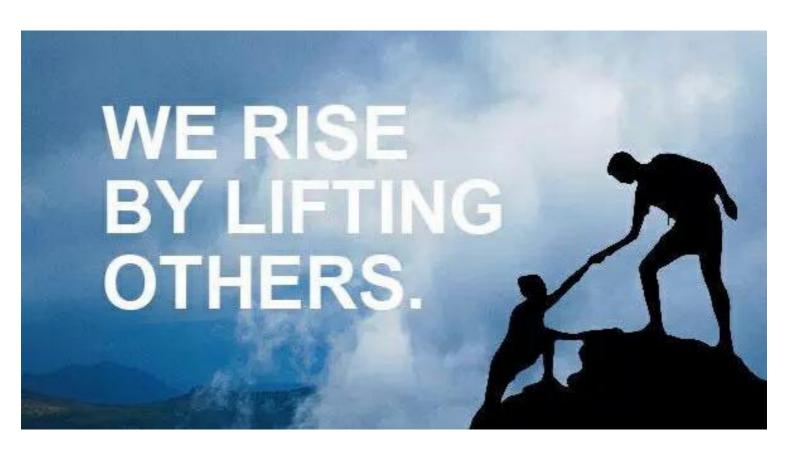

Term 4 Reminders

When students return in Term 4, it is important to remember the following College Expectations:

- ◆ A reminder that students must ensure that they have the full College uniform prepared for the first day of Term 4 (Tuesday 3rd October).
- ◆ Any hairstyles that have been altered over the break must be changed back to adhere to College expectations. As stated in the College Diary "hairstyles must be neat and tidy and not shorter than 'Clipper No. 2'. No tracks, undercuts, mohawks or extreme styles or colours are permitted.
- ◆ For girls, hair must be off the face and tied up if hair is longer than collar length. For boys, hair must be kept above the collar, boys must also be clean shaven."
- ◆ If students have misplaced or broken their lock, they will be required to purchase a new one from the College Office, this will be at a cost of \$15.

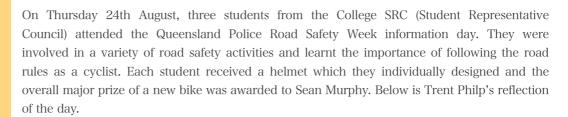

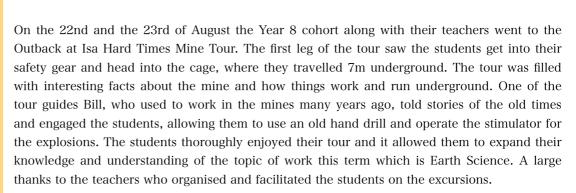
