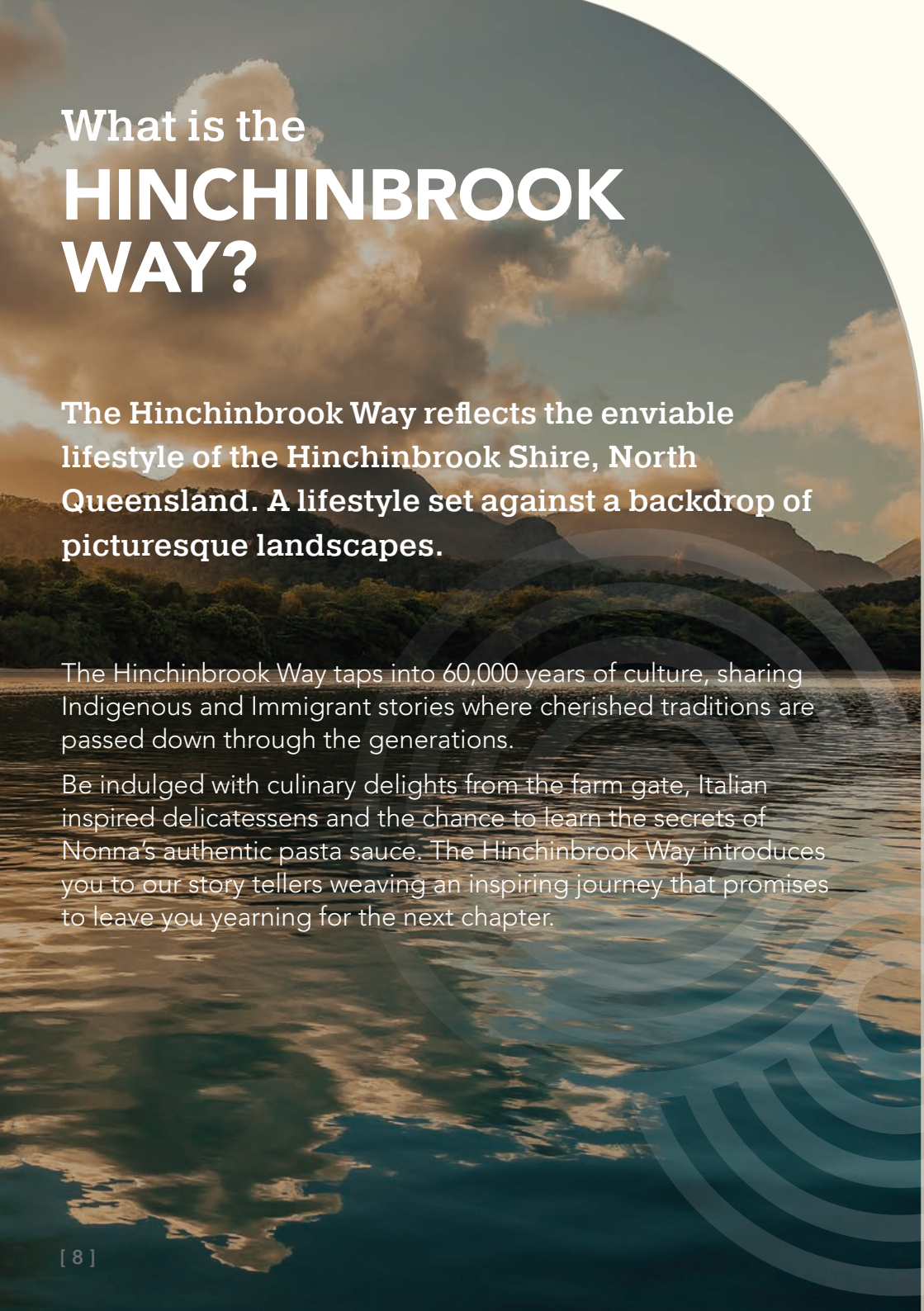

1 BIRDS OF TYTO



TYTO Wetlands is named after the Eastern Grass Owl, *Tyto longimembris*. This unique and majestic species is a nocturnal master of the wetlands. Their superior eyesight, flight capabilities and ability to walk through tall grasslands make them deadly hunters.

Eastern Grass Owls camouflage their nests on the ground, making a nest chamber with a tunnel runway leading out of the tall grass. The owls range in size from 32cm to 42cm in height with a wingspan from 100cm to 116cm, comparable to the height of an average 6-year-old child.

2 THE RAINTREES OF HINCHINBROOK



Raintrees once dominated the Ingham streetscape and can still be seen in picturesque abundance at the local Macknade Mill. They gave shade to passengers waiting to board a steam train, a hitched horse, a tired mother and her children, or a cane cutter waiting impatiently to sign-on for the cane-cutting season.

Visitors often remarked on the "magnificent raintrees," which gave Ingham "an air of quiet dignity unique in Queensland." In later times the removal of the raintrees was done so under community protest as they gave background to so many memories of long gone days.

3 THE SUGAR INDUSTRY TODAY



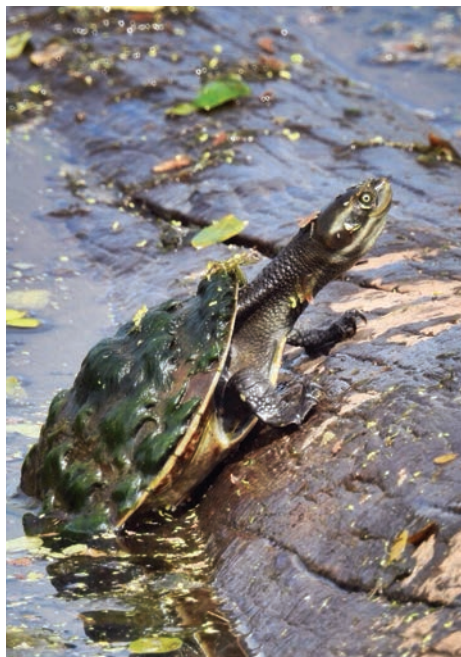
The Herbert region plays an important role in the Australian sugar industry. Throughout the crushing season that runs between the months of June and November, 4.5 million tonnes of sugarcane is harvested from 57,000 hectares of farming land. This sugarcane is processed at the region's two Wilmar Sugar Australia mills; Victoria Mill and Macknade Mill. Harvested sugarcane is transported from paddocks to the mills by cane trains. The raw sugar is delivered to the Lucinda Sugar Terminal for storage, before being shipped to international and domestic customers.



4 LOCAL LOVE STORIES

Under an Australian sun, Italian courtship and marriage traditions were transformed. Early immigrants tended to marry others from their own region. Single men often returned to Italy to find a marriage partner or sent a self-portrait home for their family to arrange a marriage. Soon however, Italian immigrants were marrying local non-Italian girls.

As many more people from diverse backgrounds moved to the Hinchinbrook region, it was inevitable that new cultural values would be formed. The history of cultural adaptation and respect for traditions is one of Hinchinbrook's greatest strengths.



5 KREFFTS SHORT-NECKED TURTLE

Kreffts Short-Necked Turtles (*Emydura macquarii krefftii*) can be seen basking in the sunshine on a rock or paddling beneath the water, head popping up now and then, opportunistically hoping for passing insects. The traditional custodians of the land, the Nywaigi, Warrgamay and Bandjin Peoples included turtles in their diet, both marine and freshwater. The flesh was eaten roasted and the shells were used to make fishhooks.

Kreffts Short-Necked Turtles can survive droughts for months by burrowing underneath the surface into the mud, only to reappear with the first storms of the wet season.

6 OBSERVATION TOWER



Scale the 11m Observation Tower for a birds eye view of TYTO and beyond. From the observation deck cast your eyes out over the canopies of raintrees and melaleucas, observe the many species that inhabit the main lagoon, follow the rich green cane fields that stretch across alluvial plains to sweeping mountain ranges or watch the daily hustle and bustle of Ingham. A great photo opportunity for a unique perspective on the region!

7 MINI MILITARY MUSEUM

World War I was fought very close to home. With danger imminent, local young men joined the Militia or Citizens Military Force. The World War I local militia was a Company of the 31st Battalion, with personnel coming from Townsville, Bowen, the Burdekin, Charters Towers and Ingham.

To discover the story of the 31st Battalion, Kennedy Regiment, visit the mini Military Museum, located within the Hinchinbrook Shire Library.

8 TYTO REGIONAL ART GALLERY



Marvel at the latest exhibition with the contemporary space showcasing local artisans and craft enthusiasts through an annual program and retail outlet. Complimentary workshops and activities are presented through the What's On Hinchinbrook Way Program to champion further creativity and imagination.

9 NATURE INSPIRED URBAN DESIGN

10 PIEMONTE TO QUEENSLAND – CESARE COSTANZO'S JOURNEY



The name Costanzo is common in Casale Popolo, but in Ingham, the name is only borne by two families. That one of those families is here, bears witness to the courage of Guiseppe Costanzo, who following World War I made the long journey alone to Australia in the hope that he would make enough money to raise the fares for his wife and children to join him.

A living was scarcely to be had in the rural countryside surrounding Casale Popolo, a village just 14 kilometres from Conzano, in the province of Alessandria in Piemonte. By 1927, storm clouds of discontent that would lead to an unimaginable World War II were already brewing.

16 year old Cesare Costanzo found nothing to be optimistic about as his tummy rumbled and his young back strained as he carried and laid bricks.

Grimly determined to better his lot, he decided to follow his father Guiseppe. Cesare followed not only in his father's footsteps but in those who since 1891 had been leaving the harsh economic conditions of Piemonte to labour in the cane fields of Tropical North Queensland. Here, there were jobs to be had and money to be made.

For Cesare and his family the gamble of migration paid off. He purchased a shop in the small township of Trebonne, his sister a delicatessen in Ingham and his son, in time, would become a Councillor of the Hinchinbrook Shire Council.

11 MERCER LANE



Mercer Lane houses an incredible 42 metres of mosaic art panels depicting the history of the local sugar cane industry. Local business woman Karen Venables and artist Kate Carr rallied the community together, resulting in over 1,500 locals and visitors participating in the project. The medium of mosaics was used because it can be quickly learned, and because of its association with the artwork of ancient Italy and Italians who make up a significant percentage of the local population.

12 LEE'S HOTEL



During the World War II period, Lee's Hotel, then known as the Day Dawn Hotel, was the first hotel encountered by troop convoys as they passed through Ingham. Upon their arrival, regardless of the hour, the bar opened for service. Because of the war, the hotels beer supply was restricted by quotas and on one hot thirsty day, the troops drank the bar dry. Amazed at being unable to buy beer at his favourite pub that day, local poet Dan Sheahan wrote the poem "A Pub Without Beer". Years later, the song "A Pub With No Beer", written by Gordon Parsons and sung by Slim Dusty, was released based upon the original verses of Dan Sheahan's historic poem.

13 MARIO TORRISI – A GENTLEMAN OF THE FLASHING BLADE



It is a long time since cane cutters toiled “like heroes” “to gather in the harvest” but Mario Torrisi was determined that the unique way of life and work of the heroic cane cutter is never forgotten.

Post World War II Australia experienced an economic boom and immigration was again encouraged, particularly of the Displaced Person Refugees, Italians and Spaniards. These groups were regarded as the saviours of the cane industry in a time of over full employment when it was nearly impossible to entice local young men into the cane fields. Immigrant ships plied the seas between Europe and Australia, one being the Toscana on which young Mario Torrisi travelled with little more than a suitcase and hope. After emigrating from

Sicilia – Giarre province, Catania Italy, Mario arrived in Sydney in January in 1951 and by June was a ‘new chum’ cutting cane in North Queensland.

Mario had a daily routine that was dirty, back breaking and even dangerous at times, and included laying the portable rail, loading the previous day’s rake of cut cane, cutting the next rake, and finally burning for the next day’s cut. By 1962 Mario was no longer a “new chum” cane cutter but a loco driver at Victoria Mill. There he witnessed, from another perspective, the transition from hand cutting to mechanical cutting and the final exodus of the cane cutter from the cane fields.

14 INGHAM POST OFFICE



In 1874 mail took 45 days to arrive from Brisbane, if at all, and when it arrived at the Dungeness seaport there was nobody there authorised to receive or forward it.

Dissatisfaction led to a petition sent to the Post-Master General but it was only with the increased traffic on the stock route that the Lower Herbert Post and Telegraph Office was opened on the newly gazetted Town Reserve on Palm Creek in 1875.

In 1935 a new post office was built. Its heritage value today is described as “one of the last generally Colonial revival post offices in Australia”.

15 SUGAR TRACKS



A journey that brings to life a yesteryear that shaped the great pioneering cane community of Hinchinbrook.

The farm machinery you will see, demonstrates an industry as it changed over time from horse to tractor power, from manual to mechanical processes. Inanimate as they are, to them still clings the romance of, and nostalgia for, an industry whose activities in the days of the manual cane cutter, woke the Valley each June from the long sleep of the slack into the exhilarating days of the crushing season.

16 AGILE WALLABIES



The Agile Wallaby (*Macropus agilis*) frequents TYTO Parklands during early morning and late evening feeding on succulent grasses. They often live in smaller groups of up to 10 individuals but can be seen at TYTO in much larger mobs feeding with their Joeys at foot. With a permanent water source and plenty of open grassy areas to feed upon, they are able to breed all year round. If you take your time and walk through either TYTO Parklands or TYTO Wetlands you may be pleasantly surprised by the abundance of photographic opportunities these normally shy creatures provide.

1 TYTO



Before you embark on your experience discovering the delights of the Hinchinbrook Way Drive, take the time to explore TYTO. What is TYTO?

TYTO is the eclectic, the unexpected; where the discovery of art, culture, nature and knowledge unfolds. It is a place of inspiration that honours, in name, the *Tyto longimembris* (Eastern Grass Owl). TYTO is so much more than a wetland. Year round it plays host to a fusion of events, activities and workshops. A perfect place to while away an hour or a day.

2 HERBERT RIVER



The Herbert River, crossed twice during the Hinchinbrook Way drive is mighty when in flood, but a gentle meandering sandy river through all other times. Originating high on the Atherton Tablelands, the river flows east 150km through the rugged Herbert River Gorge and out across the floodplains providing the fertility for the Hinchinbrook region's farming before culminating at the southern end of the Hinchinbrook Channel.

3 SEYMOUR HOTEL



Built in 1903, the original hotel burnt down in 1928 and was rebuilt as a two storey concrete building in 1929. In the floods of 1967, over 2 metres of water flowed through the bottom rooms of the hotel, so many locals took refuge on the upper floor, where drink service was maintained!

Current publican, Douglas Barrie, is a noted local historian who has researched the crash of the Texas Terror, a US Liberator Bomber, on Hinchinbrook Island in 1942.

4 MACKNADE MILL



Macknade Mill is the oldest continuously operating sugar mill in Australia. Located on the banks of the Herbert River near Halifax, Macknade commenced crushing in August 1873. The Macknade plantation and mill were established by brothers Frank and Arthur Neame, from Kent in England.. In 1896 the mill was purchased by the Colonial Sugar Company Ltd (CSR) for £6500. Today, the single milling train factory crushes about 1.4 million tonnes of cane to produce about 125,000 tonnes of raw sugar. *Due to Workplace Health & Safety considerations, public site tours are not available.*

5 HALIFAX

Queensland's quintessential tropical heritage town nestled against the Herbert River bank with shady mango trees adorning the heritage streets and a tropical mountain backdrop. The township prospered through late 19th Century rivalling Ingham; however the development of a sugar tram line in the mid 1890's from Ingham to the deep-water port of Lucinda curtailed its future expansion. Today, Halifax is a vibrant country town with a population of 400 people, two primary schools, diverse businesses and nearby some of the world's iconic fishing destinations.

6 LUCINDA

Backed by 3 kilometres of deep natural mangrove covered tidal flats, Lucinda is almost an island unto itself. For anglers, photographers and families it is the perfect destination with access to unrivalled fishing experiences, long sandy coastline and stunning scenery. The contrast of the rising or setting sun, golden beach, calm sea and backdrop of Hinchinbrook Island juxtaposed against the engineering marvel that is the Lucinda Jetty makes for a composition that even amateur photographers will delight in.

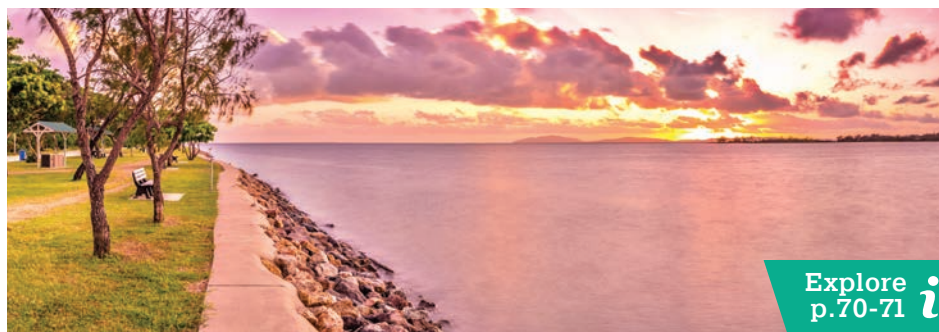
7 DUNGENESS

Dungeness is more than just a gateway to wild iconic tropical havens; it is a destination in itself. Perched on the edge of a mangrove wilderness with majestic views of Hinchinbrook Island; it provides more than enough reasons to slow down your journey and soak up the scenery. Grab a cold beer from the local pub, check out the views of the channel from the viewing tower. Hire a tinny or houseboat, charter a fishing expedition, book a day tour on Hinchinbrook Island, board a scenic flight or get adventurous and take a dive trip. There are so many incredible experiences on offer that a longer stay is inevitable.

8 TAYLORS BEACH

An escape from the world, a place of serenity, where you can slow down, relax and melt away your worries. If you allow this place time, you will discover why people return for longer and longer stays. Low tide unveils a world of opportunities; watch the fascinating display of soldier crabs milling away in the mudflats; explore the marine wonders found in water pools; wander the exposed tidal flats or simply sit back and enjoy the view as boats carefully navigate through unveiled channels. If you're enticed already there is a range of local accommodation so you can drop anchor and truly unwind.

9 VICTORIA MILL



For many years Victoria Mill held the crown of the largest sugar mill in the southern hemisphere. The dual-milling train factory processes about 2.8 million tonnes of cane each year to produce about 375,000 tonnes of raw sugar. Located about 3km east of Ingham, the mill is identifiable by its triple chimney stacks, each standing about 66 metres tall. Sugar mills burn bagasse - the fibre left over after sugarcane has been crushed - in large boilers to produce steam. The energy in this steam is either converted into electricity or used as heat to power the factory. Victoria Mill exports enough renewable electricity to power more than 8,000 homes for a year.

10 MUNGALLA STATION

Mungalla Station is Australia's most accessible and authentic Indigenous experience, a successful Indigenous enterprise, a multi-award winning tourism destination and an iconic Australian cattle station. Occupied by the Nywaigi People for over 60,000 years, Mungalla Station abounds with history. First dispersed from their land in 1860 by European settlement, they later returned to Mungalla as a safe haven under the caring eye of the station owner, later only to have a small group of them taken away and exhibited as cannibals and savages in America. In 1999 Mungalla was purchased and returned to the Nywaigi People to support and benefit their existing culture.

11 FORREST BEACH

A beach that extends well beyond the horizon, beckoning the beachcomber, dog walker or romantic. With a backdrop of tropical islands, spectacular views and an ocean full of wonders, why wouldn't you take a sunset stroll along this spectacular coastline? Finish the day with a cold beer or wine by the Coral Sea at the local pub or chill out on the beach with a hand full of fresh fish and chips and watch the stunning colours of a tropical sunset.

12 TREBONNE POST OFFICE



Located on your way to Wallaman Falls, Trebonne Post Office is a small building that appears to be held together by two rusty nails. Built in 1920, the Trebonne Post Office still operates as a functional postal collection point.

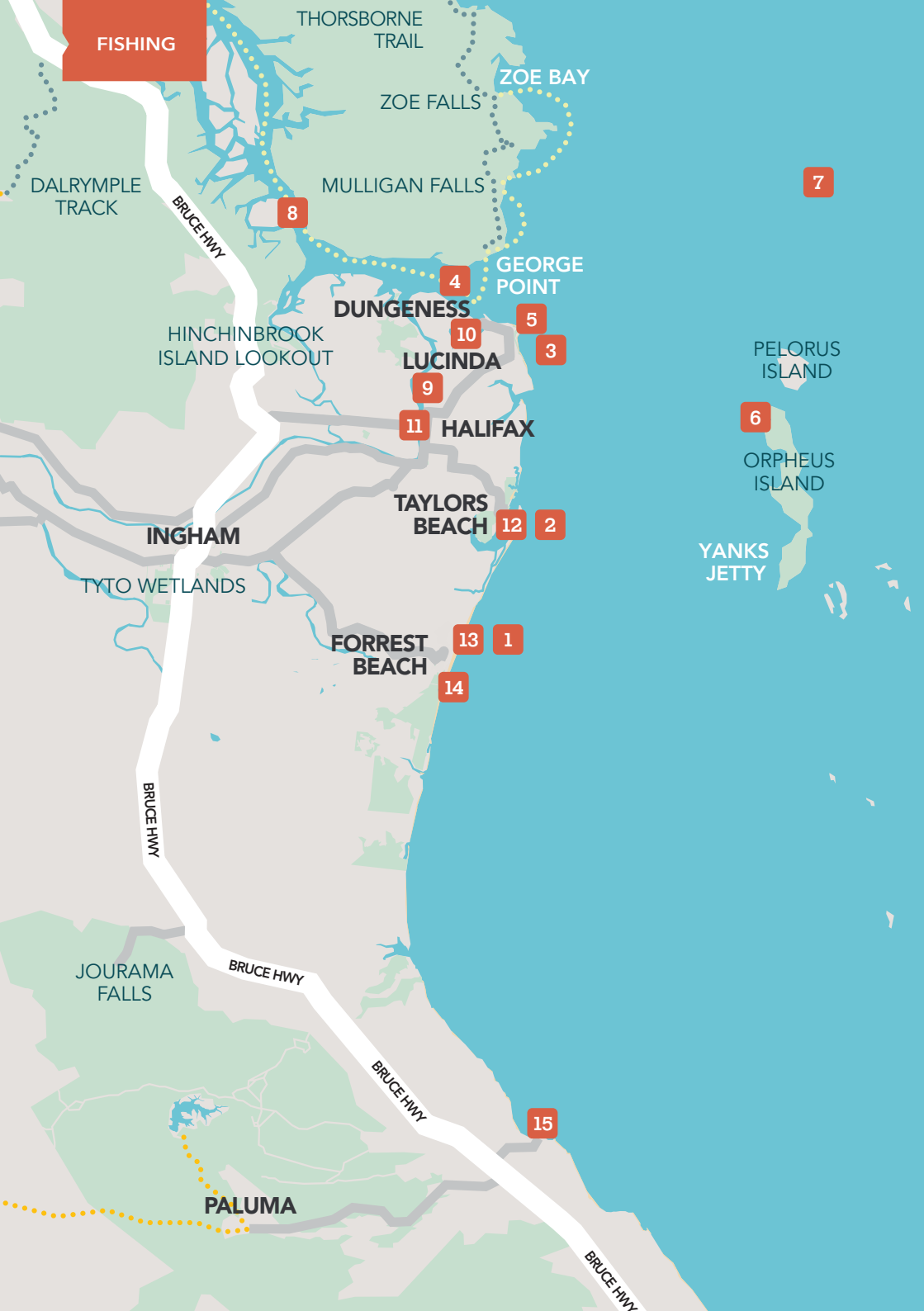

Waterfalls and Waterholes

1 WALLAMAN FALLS

The highest permanent single drop waterfall in Australia!

Wallaman Falls is part of the traditional lands of the Warrgamaygan people. 'Nginba Warrgamaygan Ngarji'. They hope you will enjoy your visit and respect this sacred place.

Located within the UNESCO listed Wet Tropics in Girringun National Park, west of Ingham and surrounded by World Heritage rainforest, Wallaman Falls plunges 268 metres in a clear single drop, often through a rainbow-fringed cloud of mist. Many endangered plants and animals call this area home.

Witness its sheer size and majesty from the main lookout. Walk to the second lookout which provides stunning views of the gorge and the Herbert River Valley. Visit for a day to view the falls

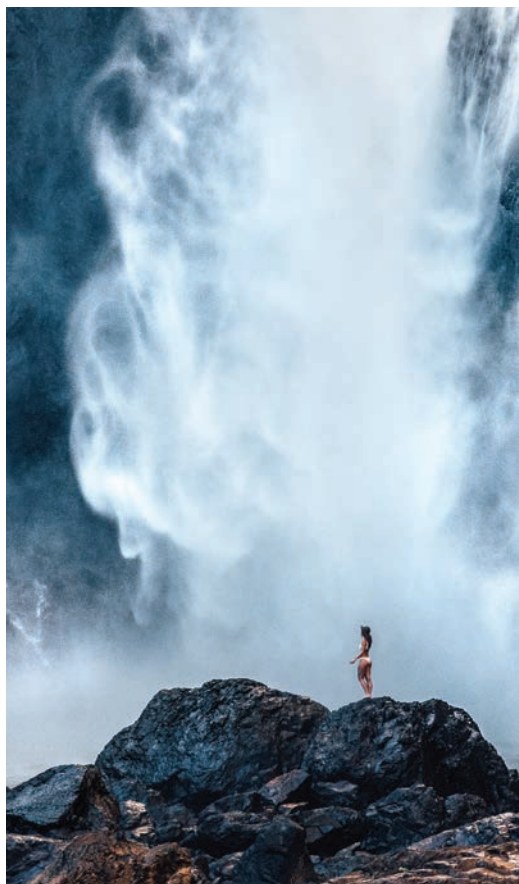
and relax over a picnic in the day use area or stay longer with an overnight camp beside Stony Creek.

CAMPING

The camping area is set amongst open woodland close to Stony Creek in the Girringun National Park. Facilities include composting toilets, cold water showers, picnic tables and wood-fired barbecues. Camping permits are essential and are available at the Hinchinbrook Visitor Information Centre or the Queensland National Parks website.

SWIMMING

Walk along the short 800m return Banggurru Track to reach a refreshing waterhole perfect for the whole family.



GETTING THERE

Wallaman Falls is 51km west of Ingham, approximately a 1 hour drive.

The roads are sealed all the way, but as it is quite a winding road it is not recommended to tow a caravan.

Cassowaries are regularly spotted walking along the side of the road, quite often with chicks during breeding season.

WALKS

Two short walks accessible from Wallaman Falls:

DJYINDA WALK

3.2km return (allow 2 hours)
Grade / Moderate

For the more adventurous, trekking to the bottom of the falls is a must!

The Djyinda walk begins 300m from Wallaman Falls lookout and ends at the base of the falls. As you meander through the rainforest down the steep trek, the views will leave you breathless.

Reaching the base, the magnitude of the falls can truly be appreciated as you hear its mighty roar!

BANGGURRU WALK

800m return (allow 45 minutes)
Grade / Easy

Experience some of the beauty of the Wet Tropics World Heritage rainforest along the banks of Stony Creek.

Be sure to spend a moment peering into the rock pools, you could be rewarded with a glimpse of a platypus, an eastern water dragon or a saw-shelled turtle, peeking through the water's surface.

2 JOURAMA FALLS

Located just 20 minutes south of Ingham, in an idyllic rainforest setting is Jourama Falls. The perfect destination for campers, photographers and bird lovers alike. For the swimmers, deep shaded swimming holes and shallow streams bordering the campgrounds are the perfect escape on a hot tropical day.

3 BROADWATER

Surrounded by gnarled shady trees, Broadwater's cool waters provide the perfect destination for a refreshing dip. Take your boogie boards and ride the rapids, as they crash over smooth rocks. Build your own little private spa in the middle of the river or relax in the calm water nooks. For explorers, discover the nearby majestic 200 year old fig tree.

4 ZOE FALLS



Immerse yourself in the calm infinity pools of Zoe Falls, the crown of Hinchinbrook Island. Gaze out across the rich tropical vista comprised of deep green rainforest, rugged blue mountain peaks, the long white curving beach and tranquil deep turquoise sea.

Once you have been consumed by the trinity of Zoe (Zoe Bay, Zoe Beach and Zoe Falls), you will likely never find a comparable experience in nature.

It is not fair to contrast Mulligan Falls with Zoe Falls; however, it's easily the most accessible waterfall on the island involving only a short shuttle across from Lucinda. Set high above the beach, the falls plummet into a deep secluded swimming hole, Mulligan Falls is an ideal half day trip.

Walking Tracks

6 THORSBORNE TRAIL 3-5 DAYS



Australia's best coastal walking trail, Hinchinbrook Island's rugged Thorsborne Trail is one of the World's best multi-day walking experiences. The trail traverses an incredible diversity of terrain, from rugged tropical peaks, stunning coastal beaches, rocky shorelines, melaleuca swamps and patches of eucalypts and rainforest. As the trail winds its way 32km south from Ramsay Beach to George Point, it intersects many of the islands iconic destinations including Nina Peak, Zoe Bay and Mulligan Falls.

For the ultimate experience walk the trail from north to south and book your boat transfers to and from Lucinda. This option delivers a stunning early morning one hour cruise of the incredibly photogenic Hinchinbrook Channel enroute to Ramsay Bay. The beauty of this option is once you have finished the trail it is only a 15 minute transfer from George Point back to your transport, hot showers, hot meals and a cold brew!

Access to the Thorsborne Trail is either by private vessel launched from Lucinda (Dungeness) or by a commercial ferry which transports walkers to the Thorsborne Trail.

CAMPING

Camping permits are available from the friendly staff at the Hinchinbrook Visitor Information Centre or Queensland National Parks website.





7 DALRYMPLE TRACK 1 DAY

This difficult 10km track was used by three local Indigenous groups to cross the Cardwell Range. Later transformed by early European settlers into North Queensland's first road suitable for wheeled traffic. The stone pitched bridge, still located there today at the summit of the walks, is the oldest surviving example of civil engineering work on mainland North Queensland.

8 MOUNT FOX HALF DAY



Standing tall above the surrounding eucalypt woodlands, the secluded Mount Fox crater is formed from an ancient volcano.

Take the time to trek up rugged walking tracks to reveal spectacular views of the surrounding Kangaroo Hills and countryside.

If you're lucky enough you may even encounter the endangered Sharman's Rock-Wallaby.

9 DJAGANY WALK 3 DAYS



Starting at Wallaman Falls, the 56.8km Djagany (goanna) walk traverses an abandoned forestry trail through open forest, she-oaks and rainforest. The trail provides access to seldom visited waterfalls and river systems and is ideal for experienced bushwalkers. A highlight of the walk is the Pack Trail campsite with expansive views over the surrounding range.

10 HINCHINBROOK ISLAND

Hinchinbrook Island is one of Australia's largest island National Parks (39,900ha). It is within the Great Barrier Reef World Heritage Area and is separated from the mainland by scenic, mangrove-fringed Hinchinbrook Channel with 164km of robust mangrove estuaries.

Hinchinbrook Island is described as a "wilderness area", wild and rugged with soaring mountainous peaks. Its highest mountain is Mount Bowen, (1,142 metres) above sea level. Other notable mountain summits are The Thumb (981 metres), Mount Diamantina (953 metres) and Mount Straloch (922 metres).

Although the biggest island on the Great Barrier Reef, Hinchinbrook Island is completely uninhabited. To protect the Island's biodiversity and prevent damage to the environment, just 40 people are permitted to stay at any

one time. If you have a desire for adventure, Hinchinbrook Island is your ultimate playground. It offers spectacular hiking and camping along the famous 32km Thorsborne Trail, internationally rated one of the top 10 walks on the planet.

To start your hiking expedition on Hinchinbrook Island take a short boat ride or private charter from Lucinda. The views are nothing short of spectacular and the long sandy beaches and extensive mangrove areas make Hinchinbrook Island an environmental haven for turtles, dugongs and many other marine creatures.

Hinchinbrook Island is the perfect place to restore your body, mind and spirit. This is the Island to choose if you want peace, beauty, tranquillity and a hint of adventure.

11 ORPHEUS ISLAND



Orpheus Island, a paradise for nature lovers; home to over 1,000 different vibrant and colourful marine species.

For the snorkelling enthusiasts Yanks Jetty (located at the southern end of the island) is the ideal launching pad to explore the fringing coral reefs.

Broadwater National Park

Broadwater is at the epicenter of four distinct ecosystems, rainforest, riverine, wet sclerophyll and dry sclerophyll allowing birds to be seen on the fringes of their habitat. *Key Birdwatching Species: Lesser Sooty Owl, Double-eyed Fig-parrot, Noisy Pitta, Yellow-breasted Boatbill and Wompoo Fruit-dove.*

Taylors Beach

With Islands and fringing reef so close with mangroves easily accessible at low tide, Taylors Beach provides the avid bird watcher an avenue to seek those birds not commonly seen. *Key Birdwatching Species: Mangrove Robin, Osprey, Pied Oystercatcher, White-bellied Sea-eagle and Red-tailed Black Cockatoo.*

Hinchinbrook's sugar history is portrayed in Mercer Lane's 42 metre mosaic tiles, created by local artist Kate Carr and her team of mosaicists.

A short coastal stroll along the foreshore, past unique hedged mangroves.

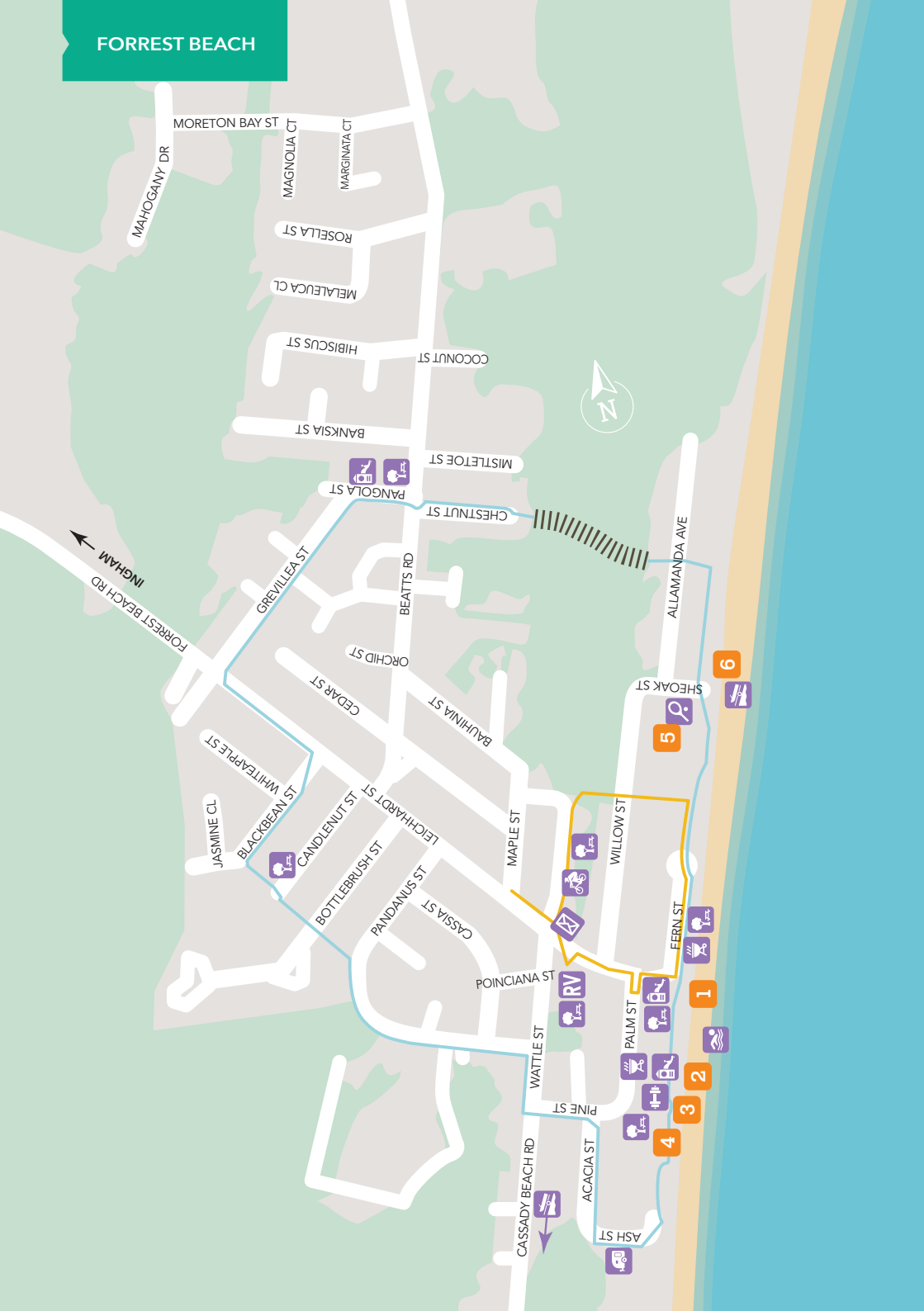

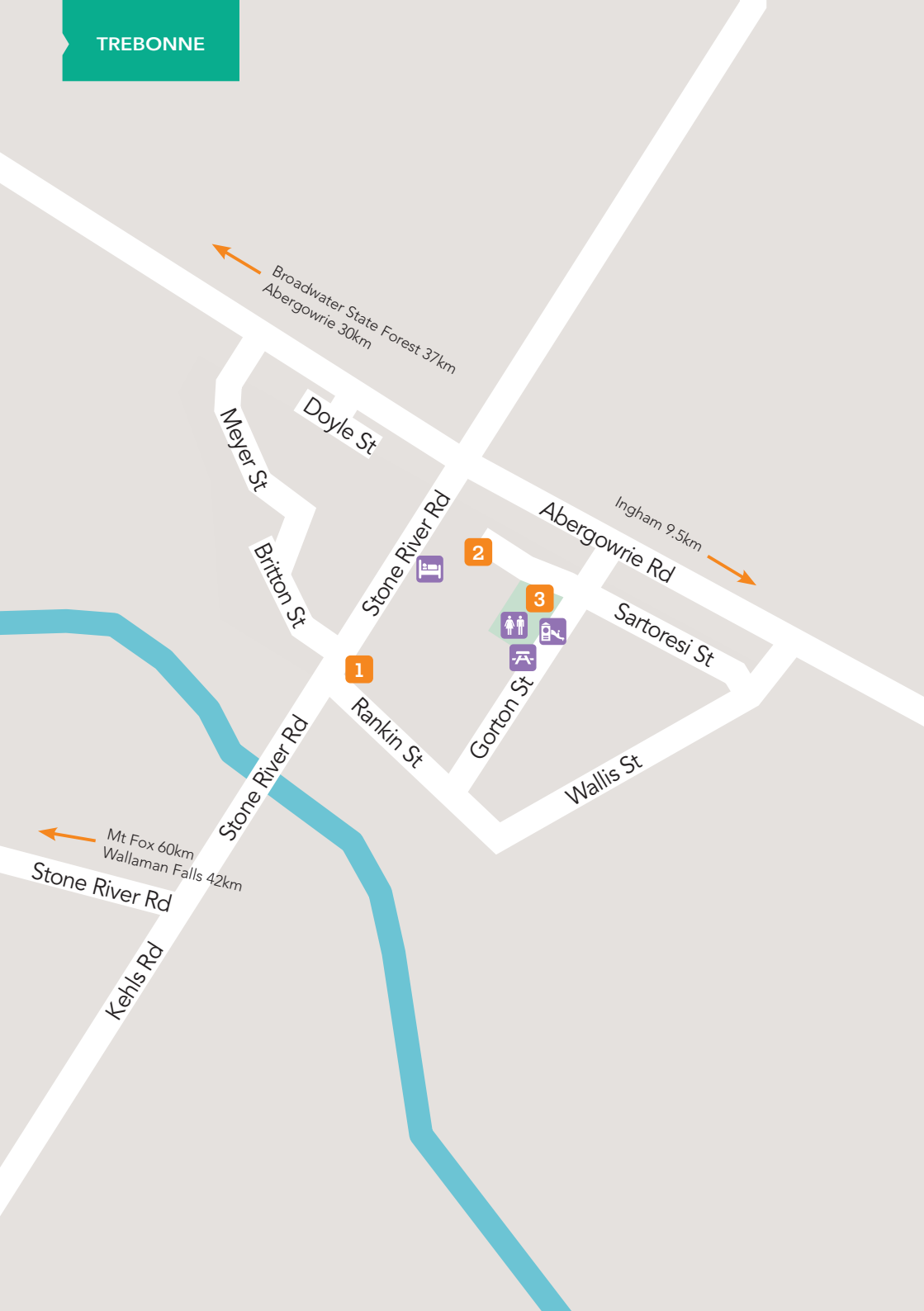

1 TREBONNE POST OFFICE

With the appearance of being held together by two rusty nails, the very quaint and photogenic weatherboard clad Trebonne Post Office has been operating untouched for almost 100 years.

2 PELOTA MANO COURT (BASQUE HANDBALL COURT)

Listed on the Queensland Heritage Register, the Pelota Mano (handball) court constructed in 1959 is a rare illustration of the presence of Basque culture in Queensland. The court comprises two reinforced concrete walls and concrete slabs on the ground and is particularly significant for its rarity as the only purpose built handball court constructed in Queensland. Time for a game of handball... The court is open to the public and there is no charge for use.
