Introduction

Welcome back to Term 3. I hope all families had a restful break. I know it has been an interesting break for many families with border closures, lockdowns and sports cancellations which resulted in many families having to postpone holidays here in Queensland or interstate. Despite the many uncertainties during the break, a wonderful achievement was last week was seeing Ash Barty on centre court at Wimbledon, 50 years after Evonne Goolagong winning the finals. After winning the finals she stated, "Wimbledon for me has been an amazing place of learning." She looked back on previous losses there, saying, "A lot of the time, your greatest growth comes from your darkest times. That's why this tournament has been so important to me. I've learned so much with all my experiences – the good, bad, everything in between I've been able to learn from. Just to be able to keep chipping away, keep putting yourself out there, let yourself be vulnerable, just be yourself, knowing that everything that comes with that is an opportunity to learn." I believe Ash Barty is just so down to earth, so grounded – that's one thing we all like about her. She has reached the pinnacle of her sport without losing touch with where she comes from, and who she is.

Her message is an example for all our students. She calls us to be courageous, to embrace our vulnerability and to see moments of challenge as an opportunity to grow and learn. Life is a journey and many of our students at the end of last term received their Semester One reports. I hope parents had an opportunity to sit down with their son in order to discuss all aspects of their particular semester report. Such a discussion can be used to celebrate those areas in which effort and achievement are positive and likewise, to highlight those areas in which improvements need to be made.

The analysis of reports should be used as the basis for meaningful conversations about application to school, establishing a consistent approach to home studies and identifying areas for improvement in the future. 

Dear Parents, Carers and Community,

I trust you had a great mid-year break and rugged up for the two or three days of winter we received!

This term is a big one in the life of the College; Identity and Mission wise. There is a very strong Social Justice theme in Term 3 which sees lots of activity and community work happening. Just a few of the things to look out for when your son comes home discussing them: TCLC visits are back on, SVDP Homeless Sleepout, Women's Shelter Domestic Violence care package drive, Brooklea Elderly visits (TBC following new COVID restrictions back in force), Be: Connected Elderly Visits in R&E classes, Holy Spirit Reding Club, Year 12 Drop-in-Centre visits... just to name a few!

Please encourage your son to get involved in as many of these initiatives and causes as possible, a little from many goes a long way! In planning all these events, it got me thinking about how we are teaching our students not just to "do" these things blindly, but the advocacy behind "why" we "do" these things. How do we prepare them? How does the work we do flow through to the boys lives outside of school? All things we aim to answer with each and every social justice action we undertake.

Jesus sent out his disciples without a degree in theology, without a certificate from a diocesan training program, and without a catechism. Two by two, they walked along with no more than a pair of sandals and a walking stick, both crucial to keep them on the journey. With so little, they still summoned the authority to cast out demons, heal the sick, and preach repentance.

This amazes me, having the degree, pedigree, and reference books by the score to keep me in the arena of orthodoxy. Yet I'm not certain that demons are at all intimidated by these things. Though institutions may grant credibility, only God can provide the authority for ministry. And God grants it to slackers like Peter, not much of a fisherman but possessed of interesting impulses; to James and John, much admired by their mother, at least; and even to Judas, more loyal to himself than to the Lord. It seems God favours those who are willing to stay on the road and travel light. The walking stick is the best credential of all.

What do you carry, in your heart and on your back, that limits your ability to serve?

Time to lighten the load! I encourage every reading this to identify one element in your life - a relationship, attitude, behaviour - that chronically keeps you from progressing on the spiritual journey. Take steps to reconcile, heal, and move forward.

Athletics Carnival

The Interhouse Athletics is scheduled for this Thursday and Friday. .

Thursday: Students must wear Sports Uniform with runners and hat.

Friday: Students are to wear sunsmart attire in their House theme with runners and hat.

Parents may attend if wearing a mask and must sign in as well as check-in via the app.

All boys are encouraged to compete in the 100m, 200m, Discus, Javelin, Shot Put, Long Jump and Triple Jump. Other events such as 400m, 800m, 1500m, 3,,000m, and High Jump are by nomination only. These nominations are made through the Pastoral Coordinators.

High Jump Information

The College recently received an update from the Northern Regional School Sport on conducting High Jump events. A summary follows:

Similar to previous years, the scissors technique has been classified as medium risk by the Education Department.

Again, similar to the last two years the Fosbury Flop technique has been classified by the Education Department as a high-risk activity. This technique can only be taught in small groups and students need to be competence certified.

In the past, an experienced teacher could sign the competency certificate. However, the latest advice lists the minimum qualifications required as a level two club coach or someone who has completed Athletic Coaching part B. Qualifications need to be current.

Northern Regional Schol Sport advise that a Parental/Guardian, a medical declaration, and a certificate of competence by a qualified coach needs to complete and archived. Please see next page for information.

Staff member Mr Casey Raeside has volunteered to upgrade his qualifications. This will benefit students in the future. In the interim students who wish to use the Fosbury Flop may need to access a club coach to sign off the competence certificate.

A hard copy of the competency certificate can be collected from the College sports office and can be accessed online.

The Department of Transport and Main Roads (TMR) is undertaking a planning project to improve road safety, capacity and connectivity upgrades across Townsville.

Once completed, the study will identify and investigate road, pedestrian and cycling gaps, issues, opportunities and constraints along the following key links:

- University Road and Yolanda Drive intersection
- Thuringowa Drive (between Dalrymple Road and Riverway Drive)
- Ross River Road (between Charters Towers Road and Nathan Street).

TMR recognises that the experiences of motorists, pedestrians and cyclists using these links is key to understanding local issues. The survey and online interactive map will capture your feedback about what issues you have experienced as a road user and any solutions you would like to suggest to improve the safety, capacity and connectivity along these roads.

This feedback will be investigated by TMR then prioritised based on the resulting safety improvements. These improvements will then be progressed through the remaining project planning phases (including Business Case planning, which is used to seek funding for construction).
