### From the Principal

Dear Parents and Carers

It was great to see three of our Old Boys – *Michael Morgan, Valentine Holmes and Coen Hess* – contribute to Queensland's win in last night's State of Origin game. Hopefully, this will serve as motivation as our Confraternity Rugby League team travels to Brisbane (Padua College) this week for the annual Confraternity Shield Carnival. The boys and coaches have put in many hours of preparation for this Carnival and we wish them well.

I would like to finish this term with a tribute to all those who got out of their comfort zone in Semester 1. In 1910, US President Theodore Roosevelt delivered a powerful and inspiring speech at the Sorbonne in Paris, titled *Citizenship in a Republic*. This speech emphasised his belief that the success of a Republic rested not on the brilliance of its citizens but on the **disciplined work and character**; the quality of its people. Roosevelt addressed the importance of having a go, of possessing the courage to fight those big battles in life, even if they may end in defeat.

We see all too often those who dare to do great things can meet with cynicism and criticism. It even happens within our own schools and Church. The Pope's recent Encyclical *Laudato Si on common care of our common home* is a prime example. Our schools, our Church and communities need leaders, people who will stand up for what they believe, who at times will take some risks, who have the courage to make our society a better place, who won't be bystanders, but engaged participants.

Roosevelt captured this sentiment when he said (and this remains one of my favourite quotes from history):

***"It is not the critic who counts;  
nor the man who points out how the strong man stumbles;  
or where the doer of deeds could have done better.  
The credit belongs to the man who is actually in the arena,  
whose face is marred by dust and sweat and blood.  
If he fails at least fail daring greatly, so that his place shall never be  
with those cold and timid souls who neither know victory nor defeat."***

If one lacks the courage and character to risk in pursuit of achieving worthwhile goals – they will never realise their potential nor achieve anything of significance in their life.

There is no question that at Ignatius Park we have produced so many who have dared to be that "man in the arena" who have had the courage to roll up their sleeves and have their face marred by dust and sweat. Some have gone on to hold positions of great influence and make significant contributions to the wider community.

As well as being the last newsletter for the term, it is my last newsletter before I commence Renewal Leave. Tomorrow is my last day and Brendan Stewart will be Acting Principal in my absence. I return from leave on Tuesday, 3 October 2017. I would like to take this opportunity to wish our families an enjoyable holiday.



## Subject Preferences for Year 9 and 11 Students in 2018

Today all Year 8 and Year 10 students have received information about the upcoming Subject Information Evening. This included details on the range of subjects available, as well as how to access the Online Subject Preferences Portal on the evening and from home.

The Online Subject Preferences Portal will be accessible from 7:30pm on Tuesday, 11 July, which is during the Subject Information Evening. Parents and students, who are able to attend on the evening, will be able to log in during the event and take advantage of the support available. However, parents, carers and their sons can access this from anywhere via an internet connection.

To assist your son in preparing to nominate his preferred subjects for 2018, we have uploaded the Middle and Senior School Curriculum Handbooks and an Online Preference Guide to our College website at: <https://www.ipc.qld.edu.au/studies/handbooks/>. These documents detail how to submit subject preferences for Year 9 and 11 in 2018. Your son will bring home a paper copy of the manual with him this afternoon. Key dates and events are also shown in the timeline graphic.

The nomination of student subject preferences is important, as they are used to build the College timetable for 2018. The basic requirements of this process are outlined below:

### Students in Year 10 moving into Year 11 in 2018 are:

- Required to nominate their preferred subject option for Religious Education, English and Mathematics;
- Required to nominate their preferred 3 elective subjects, in order of preference; and
- Required to nominate their preferred reserve elective subject that they would be willing to study if they are not able to be assigned one of their top 3.

### Students in Year 8 moving into Year 9 in 2018 are:

- Required to nominate their preferred subject option for English, Mathematics and Science;
- Required to nominate their preferred 3 elective subjects, in order of preference; and
- Required to nominate their preferred reserve elective subject that they would be willing to study if they are not able to be assigned one of their top 3.

At Ignatius Park College, we strive to develop a timetable that best suits most of our students' preferred pathways of study. However, unfortunately due to subject combinations/conflicts, class sizes, resources and safety of students (particularly in the VET Certified subjects) this may not always be possible. On Tuesday 25 July, all Year 8 and 10 students will receive a listing of the subjects they have been assigned for 2018, based on the preferences they have submitted. Year 10 students can change their subjects before or at the SET Plan Interviews, which will take place from 8am to 5pm on Tuesday 1 August in the Edmund Rice Hall. Year 8 students will have until the end of Term 3 to change their subjects, by completing a subject change form which they can collect from the Edmund Rice Room.



## The Premier's Reading Challenge

## Counsellors News

### Developing independence in secondary school

Practical independence-building ideas to encourage autonomy in adolescents.

The ultimate goal for an adolescent is to achieve autonomy from their parents. They are trying to do this at a tricky time, with their brain going through fundamental changes in the prefrontal cortex – the part of the brain responsible for rational decision-making, thinking things through and impulse control. As a result, you need to carefully support your child's journey to independence through this stage.

Here are some more practical independence-building ideas:

#### 1. Negotiate independence

Give your young adolescent the chance to negotiate greater independence by allowing them to prove to you that they are ready to have their boundaries pushed out. This is the age when you can build 'scaffolds' to greater independence: allow your child to achieve increasingly greater autonomy, taking lots of small steps rather than one large step.

#### 2. Talk about values

Discuss values of fairness, tolerance and respect with your young person to help them formulate a sense of responsibility and a positive value system. Be clear about your expectations of their behaviour when they are not with you. Discuss the consequences of breaking these rules. And help your young person also to assess the risks associated with increased independence.

#### 3. Allocate a meal each week for your young adolescent to prepare

You may help them at first, but eventually turn the responsibility over to them. If this is unworkable for you now, consider it something to work towards by the end of this stage. Kids in this age group are more than capable of preparing a meal, and you will find it a significant contribution to the family. It may need to fit in with busy schedules, but that's okay – your child will benefit from learning that they can in fact juggle a number of activities each day. Don't let them off the hook just because they are busy.

#### 4. Give them two allowances

Young people increasingly want more power over their own life, and providing pocket money is one way to do this. Consider giving your young person enough allowance to cover clothing, mobile-phone bills, travel and school meals. Encourage them to budget, and set savings goals. This increase in autonomy will help your young person feel valued.

#### 5. Encourage a part-time job (when they are old enough)

There are a number of benefits to a part-time job, regardless of how busy your young person is. First, earning their own allowance is one of their first steps toward real autonomy. Second, it's good for them to abide by rules set by someone other than their family and school. Third, being socially connected to a community group such as a workplace is a key contributor to good mental health and wellbeing.

The group visited the Australian War Memorial and Adelaide Cemetery at Villers-Bretonneux, Serre Road Cemetry 2, the Beaumont-Hamel Newfoundland Memorial, the Pozieres Memorial and the Australian Corps Memorial Park at Le-Hamel. Highlight of the day was Liam Duffy finding his Great Great Uncle's final resting place at Serre Road and visiting the place of his final battle at The Windmill in Pozieres.

On Tuesday, we moved north into Belgium, focussing much of our attention around the lovely town of Ypres. The group visited the Flanders Field Museum in the impressive Cloth Hall, the Memorial Museum of Passchendaele 1917 and the Tyne Cot War Cemetery. In a touching finish to the day, Jacob Seri and Cooper Guest laid a wreath at the Last Post Ceremony at the Menin Gate Memorial.

The boys have thoroughly enjoyed their time in the first three days in Europe. Today we catch a train to London and embark on the next part of our tour.
