From the Principal

Dear Parents and Carers

Congratulations to our Academic First XV who were presented with their certificates and Ignatius Park watches at Monday's Assembly. Well done to **Zachary Timbs**, Captain (Dux), **Matthew Beauchamp**, Vice-Captain (Proxime Accessit) and, in alphabetical order, **Patrick Carter, Drew Diakonow, Campbell Evans, Ryan Gilmore, Lincoln Hardy, Ramal Jayawardhana, Dylan Kenworthy, Travis Keys, Jarrad Mayocchi, Nicholas McCaig, Lane Moloney, Damien Sferratore, Jordan Tuckey, and Matthew Vollmer.**

Also, congratulations to the Intermediate Cricket team who won their State semi-final on Tuesday and now progress to the State Final next week.

Last Friday we celebrated World Teacher's Day and it is an ideal time to reflect on our profession. As parents, you entrust what is most precious to your child's teacher. I am sure there is no need to write about the value of education as it is so much part of what any parent wants for their child. I hope that teachers' work and their place in young people's lives is never devalued. I honestly believe that teaching is a noble profession.

People who choose teaching as a career do so to make a difference. Sure, it can be rewarding personally, but you would not expect to make a lot of money, nor indeed should you. The following is an interesting reflection on the role of school teachers.

When this rich man insulted a woman's career choice, her response was priceless. The dinner guests were all sitting around the table discussing life. One man, a CEO, decided to explain the problem with education. He argued, "What's a kid going to learn from someone who decided his best option in life was to become a teacher?" To stress his point he said to another guest; "You're a teacher, Bonnie. Be honest. What do you make?" (She paused for a second, then began)

"Well, I make kids work harder than they ever thought they could. I make a C+ feel like a Congressional Medal of Honour winner. I make kids sit through 40 minutes of class time when their parents can't make them sit for 5 minutes with an IPod, Game Cube or movie rental. Do you really want to know what I make?" (She paused again and looked at each and every person sitting at the table.)

"I make kids wonder. I make them question. I make them apologise and mean it. I make them respect and take responsibility for their actions. I teach them how to write and then I make them write. Keyboarding isn't everything. I make them read, read, read. I make them show all their work in Maths. They use their God given brain, not the man-made calculator. I make my students from other countries learn everything they need to know about English while preserving their unique cultural identity. I make my classroom a place where all my students feel safe and secure. Finally, I make them understand that if they use the gifts they were given, work hard and follow their hearts, they can succeed in life." (Bonnie paused one last time and then continued.)

"You want to know what I make? I make a difference in all your lives, educating your kids and preparing them to become CEO's, Doctors and Engineers. What do you make Mr CEO?"

As Carl Jung put it so eloquently:

One looks back with appreciation to the brilliant teachers, but with gratitude to those who touched our human feelings. The curriculum is so much necessary raw material, but warmth is a vital element for the growing plant and the soul for the child.

Next Monday will see the start of construction of our new College Chapel. The Chapel has been in the College's Master Plan since 1968 and I am pleased to see the project commence.

During my time at Ignatius Park, the College has carried out a number of major building projects. This has included the expansion of the College facilities for Year 7, construction of the Trade Skills Centre, covered Mall area and Administration building, Canteen and Staff Room upgrades and refurbishment of the Pool and Gym facilities.

Moving forward, the College's latest Master Plan has a distinct focus on refurbishment of existing facilities, with a reduced focus on expansion. As some of the existing buildings were constructed about 50 years ago, it is time to revamp this plant.

The major projects in the latest Plan are the refurbishment of the Library and three of the oldest teaching blocks – Lacey, Killian and Nolan. These projects are expected to cost in the order of \$6.5 million. As the College is unlikely to attract any Government funding for these projects, we have been building up the College's cash reserves in order to allow for this work to be carried out in the medium-term future. I certainly hope that I have left the College in a sound enough financial position to allow the new leadership team to continue with this work.

I would like to finish today with a light-hearted look at Teaching:

"A public school teacher was arrested today at John F Kennedy International Airport this morning as he attempted to board a flight while in possession of a ruler, a protractor, a compass, a slide-rule and a calculator. At a press conference just before noon today, Attorney General Eric Holder, said he believes the man is a member of the notorious Al-Gebra movement. Although he did not identify the man, he confirmed the man has been charged by the FBI for carrying weapons of math instruction.

"Al-Gebra is a problem for us," the Attorney General said. "They derive solutions by means and extremes and sometimes go off on tangents in search of absolute values." They use secret code names like "X" and "Y" and refer to themselves as "unknowns" but we have determined that they belong to a common denominator of the axis of medieval with coordinates in every country. As the Greek philosopher Isosceles used to say, "There are three sides to every triangle." 



Return of Forms

Students are required to have this card signed-off by each of their teachers to confirm all VET assessment has been completed for the year. 
Construction of the College Chapel

Remembrance Day has been observed since the end of the First World War to remember the men and women of the armed forces who have died in the line of duty.

Its origin began at 11am on 11 November 1918, when the guns of Europe's Western Front fell silent after more than four years of continuous warfare. The Germans called for an armistice (suspension of fighting) in order to secure a peace settlement. The moment that the hostilities ceased on the Western Front became universally associated with the remembrance of those who had died in the war.

The first Remembrance Day service took place at the Cenotaph memorial in London on the first anniversary of the war's end and it was called Armistice Day. After the Second World War, the name Armistice Day was changed to Remembrance Day as it was decided the day should honour all Australia's fallen, not only those from the First World War. In current times, Remembrance Day honours all those men and women who have died or suffered in all wars, conflicts and peace operations.

A custom associated with Remembrance Day is the wearing of red poppies. Poppies were often the only sign of life across the blasted battlefields of the Western Front and in 1915 they inspired Canadian doctor Lt Col John McCrae to write the poem "In Flanders Fields". It begins with the lines:

In Flanders's fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row...

A century later, those little red flowers remain a powerful symbol of lives lost through service to our country.

Poppies (on safety pins) will be sold for \$1.00 all next week in the lead up to Remembrance Day. You can purchase your poppy from Ms Mahoney in Room 107a, or from the Identity and Mission Office (the red door).
