From the Principal

Dear Parents, Friends and Caregivers

Ignatius Park College acknowledges that the land we meet on today is the traditional lands for the Bindal and Wulgurukaba People and that we respect their spiritual relationship with their Country. We also acknowledge the Bindal and Wulgurukaba People as the traditional custodians of the Townsville region and that their cultural and heritage beliefs are still as important to the living Bindal and Wulgurukaba People today.

On Wednesday, the College community celebrated the Anniversary Mass of Ignatius Park College. Bishop Tim Harris, Bishop of Townsville, officiated the Mass with our College Chaplain, Fr Rod Ward. This Mass occurred on the Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary which commemorates the death of Mary and her bodily assumption into Heaven. It signifies the Blessed Virgin's passing into eternal life.

The Feast of the Assumption has always been an important day for the Christian Brothers. Blessed Edmund Rice devoted his prayers towards Mary and prayed before a picture of the Assumption in the St Anthony Church, in Waterford, Ireland. The Christian Brothers congregation was proclaimed on this Feast Day in the presence of the Presentation Sisters in Waterford. Br Ambrose Treacy cfc, who we commemorate this year (150 years), left Ireland, with three brothers, for Australia on this day, the Feast of the Assumption, in 1868.

This year we celebrate the 49th Anniversary of Ignatius Park College. The Foundation Stone of the College was laid and blessed on the 16 March 1969 by Bishop Leonard Faulkner. During that year work commenced on the original building, with the assistance of many volunteers. During the early period of 1969, the Year 9 – 12 students from St John Fisher's and Our Lady Mount congregated at Our Lady's Mount, Stanton Hill, for their education while the Year 5 - 8 students remained at St John Fisher's. Around the Feast of the Assumption in August 1969, students from Our Lady's Mount, Stanton Hill moved to the Ignatius Park College campus.

Our Mass celebrated not only our anniversary, but our thanks and devotion to Mary, Mother of Jesus. While the when and the how of Mary's assumption is utterly a mystery, there is no doubt that the reason for her Assumption is ultimately a matter of love, God's gracious love in response to Mary's faithfulness. In Mary we see an ordinary woman who becomes extraordinary by virtue of her faith in what God makes possible in her life. Mary not only listened to God's word and heard it, but she allowed the word to take flesh in her life. For the

heavenly rewards of such a loving discipleship and to be inspired at how humanity can be raised to such glorious heights simply because of love!

Blessed Edmund Rice once stated that:

Each Brother is an open letter from Christ– a message written not with ink but in the Spirit of the living God, with a faithful human heart to carry it.

Over the past three weeks, the Year 12 students have been cooking breakfast for the homeless at the Townsville Drop-In Centre, South Townsville. This has been an empowering experience for our students and has opened their eyes to those who are marginalized in our local community. Our Touchstone, 'Justice and Solidarity,' calls us to be people who walk beside those who do not have a voice. I was fortunate to attend one morning with four Year 12s who lived the spirit of Blessed Edmund Rice and ensured all who entered the Centre were welcome and valued for the individual gift they bring to humanity. Thank you to Mr John Deer who organised the opportunity for our students to support this valuable organisation in our local community.

This week Ignatius Park College is participating in an EREA School Renewal. This renewal occurs every five years in an Edmund Rice School and is a process by which our College community are able to critically reflect on our nature as a Catholic School in the Edmund Rice tradition and to identify ways for continuous improvement. The objective of renewal is developing positive changes for the Ignatius Park community. The panel for the School Renewal consists of Mr Ray Paxton, EREA National Director – Identity and Liberating Education, Mr Peter Chapman – EREA Northern Regional Director, Mr Craig Wattam - Principal, St Patrick's College, Strathfield, Sydney. The panel this week is interviewing staff, students, parents, board members and old collegians to gain an understanding of the culture, policies and practices of the College, ensuring we are authentic to the spirit of Blessed Edmund Rice and the EREA Touchstones.

Our first school Mass in our new College Chapel – Our Lady of the Mount - will be on Wednesday, 29 August at 8:00 am. This is an important date as it is the anniversary of the death of Blessed Edmund Rice, who passed away in 1844. All parents are welcomed to attend this historic Mass in the Chapel.

The Mass on the Feast of the Assumption this week reminds us as a College community, that we need to be like Mary and continue to be committed to the very presence of God in our lives.

A Refugee is someone who has been forced to flee his or her country because of persecution, war or violence. A Refugee has a well-founded fear of persecution from reasons of race, religion, nationality, political opinion or membership in a particular social group. Most likely, they cannot return home or are afraid to do so. War and ethnic, tribal and religious violence are leading causes of refugees fleeing their countries.

Two-thirds of all refugees worldwide come from just five countries: Syria, Afghanistan, South Sudan, Myanmar and Somalia.

QCS Test - How Can I Help My Son?

Sitting the Queensland Core Skills (QCS) Test is a milestone and Rite of Passage for about 30 000 Year 12 students annually. Over the years, Ignatius Park College students have typically achieved well in the QCS Test and it is only natural for parents and carers to want their son to do their best. Knowledge and recall of specific subjects is not assessed in the QCS Test, instead it focuses on the application of generic skills taught across all subject areas. So, this can leave many families wondering, "How do I help my son to prepare for the QCS?".

During the past two years, our Year 12 students have been working with a small group of staff to hone their skills and prepare for the test. This practice and instruction focuses upon the students developing strategies to tackle different question types that capitalise on their strengths and overcome their weaknesses. As the test days (4 and 5 September) draw nearer, one of the most important contributors for student success in the QCS Test is the encouragement that they receive from parents and carers. Outlined below are some tips for parents and carers to help their son to be prepared:

The Week Before The Test

In the lead up to the test, you can help your son by:

Demonstrating a positive attitude towards the test;

- Being confident in his ability to do his best and attempt every question;
- Encouraging him to look at his outside school commitments in advance change work schedules or give notice to coaches about missing sporting practice on the test days;
- Ensuring that he has all of the equipment/stationery needed for each test; and
- Checking in with him on how he is feeling about the test. If you notice that your son is particularly anxious, encourage them to speak with their academic mentors (Mrs Elcoate or Mr Stewart), their Pastoral Leader or one of the College Counsellors.

The Night Before the First QCS Test (Monday 3 September)

You can support your son by ensuring that they:

- · Check their equipment and pack it in their school bags;
- Double-check the starting times for each exam and what time they must be ready and waiting at the Edmund Rice Hall;
- Have packed a nutritious lunch that will sustain them through the second test of the day. Students are provided with breakfast, however, they will need to bring their own lunches each day;
- Are not studying or completing other school work or assignments during the testing days, including the night before. Hours of intense work the night before the test is unlikely to improve performance and may make your son feel more anxious;
- Are not over-stimulated help your son to make wise choices regarding the amount of screen-time they engage with;
- Have a hearty, nutritious dinner; and
- Above all, get a good night's sleep.

The Night After the First QCS Test Day (Tuesday 4 September)

You can assist your son to refresh and re-focus for Day 2 by:

- Asking him about the questions on the test, while not focusing on how he went. The QCS test is different to other tests and many students do not feel confident about their performance, even when they may have done well. Instead, ask if they attempted the question or what they wrote down when they were unsure. This may help your son to debrief and leave behind any negative thoughts from the day;
- and Instagram will still be there on Wednesday afternoon; and
- Ensuring that he gets plenty of rest and a good night's sleep.

- Encouraging him not to engage with social media throughout the afternoon and evening. Across Queensland, many students will take to social media breaking down questions and giving the "correct answers". Such posts, and the online trolls who follow them, can often make young men feel more anxious about their QCS performance and this can carry over into the second day. Snapchat and Instagram will still be there on Wednesday afternoon; and
- Ensuring that he gets plenty of rest and a good night's sleep.

There are no shortcuts to doing well on the QCS Test, your son's focus and effort in both the test and his studies is the clearest route to overall success.

Subject Allocations for 2019

Over the past two weeks, students in Year 7s to 10 have been receiving their subject allocations for 2019. If you have not received the letter from your son, please encourage him to collect his letter from the Edmund Rice Office as soon as possible.

Although we cannot guarantee that every student is able to be placed into all of their preferred subjects, we were able to achieve a timetable where, on average, 95% of students were able to get their preferred subjects. For some students in Years 7 to 9, this meant that the subjects they wished to study could be assigned, but not in the order or semester that they would prefer.

If your son has changed his preferred course of study, each letter has a subject change form attached. Subject change forms are due back to the College by Friday, 31 August 2018. Please note that subject capacity shown on the forms may alter prior to this date as student forms are returned and processed by the Office.

Academic Interviews

As part of the College's academic mentoring program, Year 12 OP students participate in an Academic Interview with an assigned mentor. We commenced the Academic Interviews with Year 12s in 2017 and we observed a considerable increase in both student performance and motivation. Typically, these interviews take place during the QCS lessons, however they focus on much more than the QCS Test.

For many young men, they have goals or dreams in mind, however, they often cannot focus on achieving these goals, as they can't see past the obstacles on the road ahead. It is a good example of the old adage of "not being able to see the forest for the trees". Addressing this mindset is the primary purpose of the Academic Interview. It is designed to help our students to develop a plan to tackle each obstacle between them and their goals - whether this be moving from a C+ to a B or A, gaining enough QCE points, passing English, Maths or Science for university entry or achieving a specific OP to get into their desired course of study after they complete school.

We refer to these sessions as interviews, although they do not operate like a typical interview. During the session, with the help of the mentor, the student analyses their academic performance and determines how through small, manageable strategic changes, they can improve and move closer to their goals. Each student is encouraged to lead the discussion and they determine the direction that the interview takes. It is important that our young men are active participants in their learning development, as research shows that students typically perform better when they are intrinsically motivated. By the end of each interview, students come away with a self-developed plan based, not only on their goals, but also on what they feel is a realistic assessment of their capabilities in the time-frame/s available. Many of our students have reported that they leave their interview feeling that they have a clear sense of direction and are motivated to work towards their goals.

At present, our priority is on completing and revisiting Year 12 interviews prior to the end of the term. From Term 4, we will open this up to all current Year 11 and 10 students who feel that they want to improve and may be unsure of what they can to do to make this happen. If your son would like to make a time to have an Academic Interview, please encourage him to see me in the Edmund Rice Office. VET and Industry Placement


Is your son doing a VET subject/course in 2019?

Rugby League - Aaron Payne Cup Grand Finals

First XIII
















Hit The Hill

SPARQ-ed

There is an opportunity to immerse in week-long enrichment activities offered to Senior students and teachers in which participants undertake a scientific project devised in collaboration with one of the world-renowned research groups within Translational Research Institute's (TRI's) partners.

For each research immersion program, a project is designed which can be carried out by the participants over the course of five consecutive days. The project aim is normally to perform research to answer a question which is connected to the work of the contributing group. These programs are conducted in a dedicated teaching laboratory on the ground floor of TRI, under the supervision of a Coordinator (an experienced registered science teacher) and tutors drawn from TRI's post-graduate students.



In addition to the experimental program, participants have the opportunity to interact with a dynamic group of students and scientists as they try to solve some of the pressing biomedical issues facing society. Participants attend research seminars at the cutting edge of biomedical science, learn valuable academic research skills in a tutorial at the Pharmacy Australian Centre of Excellence (PACE) medical library and develop their skills in science communication with the aid of UQDI's resident science writer. The culmination of the week is a closing symposium where participants present their findings to the staff and students of TRI.

The next immersion is for Years 10, 11 and 12, during the school holidays, **24-28 September**.




