Most importantly, at a time when young people are seeking leadership in areas which demand change, this statement challenges our students to consider themselves as stewards of this planet.



Last week, fourteen students and three staff travelled to Melbourne to participate in the AFL Indigenous Round which coincided with National Reconciliation Week. These students formed a Torres Strait Islander dance group and performed for a range of audiences while away. This included at the Richmond and North Melbourne Football Clubs, at Parade College (Edmund Rice school) as well as at Federation Square in the city as part of the Long Walk celebrations. The group participated in the 'Long Walk' to the MCG with approximately 20,000 people and then joined 80,000 people for the annual 'Dreamtime at the G' fixture between Richmond and Essendon.



The group had been practising since the start of the year under the guidance and support of family and community members. In particular, Victoria Tapim, Tremayne Bowie, Francis Townson and Leah Mosby were crucial in this cultural development. While the ability to share culture with a range of audiences in another part of the country was an outstanding experience, the ability to engage with their own culture and link that to their own identity was an even greater opportunity for these young men and hopefully will now provide them with a platform to continue embracing this important component of themselves.



We look forward to continuing this practice and seeing the boys dance at various events throughout the community in the future. Thanks must also go to Ms Fiona Hall and Mr Oral Power for the attendance and support of this opportunity.

VET Completion Cards

This week all Year 11 and 12 VET students received red VET Completion cards. These cards are used to track student progress. Expectations for these cards are as follow:

- Cards are to be presented to VET teachers over the next two weeks for signing.
- Teachers will only sign the card if all Semester I course work has been completed (theory and practical).
- Students must return the cards to the VET Office by Friday, 15 June (Week 9).
- If cards are returned unsigned - students will be required to attend school for VET catch-up sessions during the Week 10 exam block.
- Similarly, students who fail to return their card to the VET Office by Friday, 15 June, will be required to attend catch up sessions during the exam block in Week 10.
- Students who do not attend catch up sessions, or still have significant work outstanding after catch-up sessions, may be withdrawn from Industry Placement in week 11. These students will be required to attend school to address outstanding work during this week.

Please remind your son to get his card signed and returned to the VET Office by the due date.


Australian Mathematics Competition
