

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From the Principal

Dear Parents, Friends and Caregivers

Ignatius Park College acknowledges that the land we meet on today is the traditional lands for the Bindal and Wulgurukaba People and that we respect their spiritual relationship with their Country. We also acknowledge the Bindal and Wulgurukaba People as the traditional custodians of the Townsville region and that their cultural and heritage beliefs are still as important to the living Bindal and Wulgurukaba People today.

Last Tuesday the College celebrated World Day for Cultural Diversity for Dialogue and Development (UN) and allowed our students to wear different coloured hats to school, to represent the cultural diversity of our world. The purpose of the day was to celebrate and increase awareness on the importance of dialogue among different cultures. Ignatius Park College has been gifted with a variety of students from different cultural backgrounds. Our EREA Touchstones 'Inclusive Community' calls us as a College community, to develop in our student's, intercultural skills that builds knowledge and understanding; to sustain the diversity of our world and to learn to live together in the diversity of our languages, cultures and religions and to bring about change. The United Nations states:

"Cultural diversity is a driving force of development, not only with respect to economic growth, but also as a means of leading a more fulfilling intellectual, emotional, moral and spiritual life acceptance and recognition of cultural diversity – in particular through innovative use of media and Information and Communications Technologies (ICTs) – are conducive to dialogue among civilizations and cultures, respect and mutual understanding."

Next week is National Reconciliation Week. National Reconciliation Week originally started as the Week of Prayer for Reconciliation in 1993 and over time has become a week-long celebration from 27 May to 3 June. The significance of the starting date links to the anniversary of the 1967 Referendum that allowed Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders to be included in the National Census (27 May). The conclusion of Reconciliation Week commemorates the historic significance of the Eddie Koiki Mabo land rights decision (3 June). The theme for this year is 'Grounded in Truth, Walk Together with Courage' and that the heart of reconciliation is the relationship between the broader Australian community and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. As a community we need to foster positive race relations, a relationship grounded in a foundation of truth, and moves us forward as a united country.

As part of the National Reconciliation Week, the Torres Strait Islander dancers, comprising of 12 students from Ignatius Park College, will be travelling to Melbourne to perform at the Edmund Rice Education Australia (EREA) Reconciliation Action Plan Launch. They will be dancing as part of the ceremony of the official launch of the Reconciliation Action Plan for the 50 EREA schools in Australia. Although the launch will be the focus of the trip, on Saturday, the students will also take part in the 'Long Walk' that acknowledges the walk Michael Long did from Melbourne to Canberra to discuss Indigenous

affairs. 2019 marks the 15th anniversary of Michael Long's iconic walk to meet the Prime Minister so to get Indigenous rights back on the National agenda. The students will walk with tens of thousands of other Australians, joining Michael Long in solidarity, and walking from Federation Square to the MCG. They will also be attending the Dreamtime AFL match between Richmond and Essendon and performing at Parade College, which is Australia's oldest Christian Brothers school. Thank you to Mr Andrew Kirkpatrick, Mr Tristan Neilman-Adams, Mr Danny Anau and Mrs Fiona Hall who are supervising the students.



Year 10 Senior Pathway and Careers Days (SET Plans)






