Our Mission

The James Cook University Student Association is an organisation directed by elected and appointed Office Bearers which aims to provide high quality representation, support services and relevant non-academic activities to all of its members.



Objectives

Under the JCUSA Constitution, the objectives of the Association are:

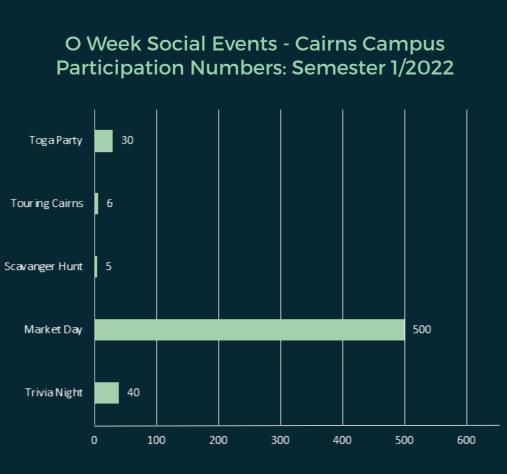
Orientation (O) Week

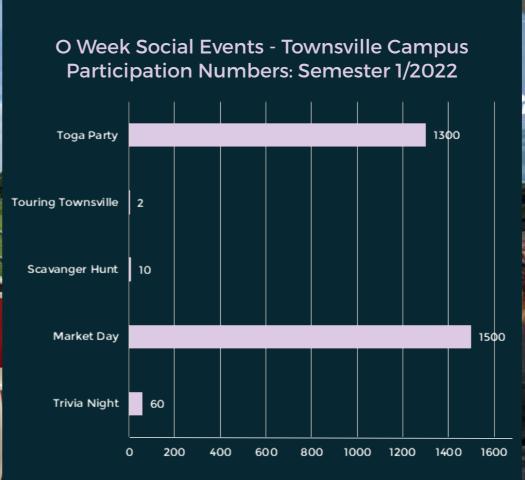

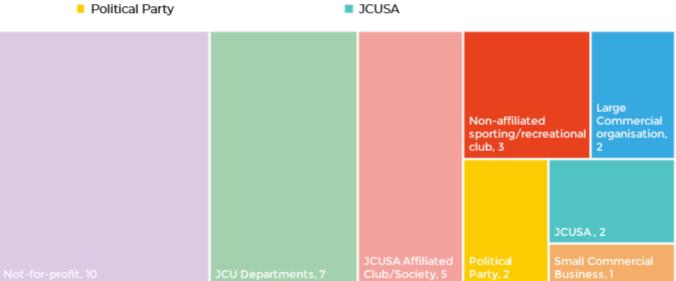

Less enrollments typically commence in Semester 2.

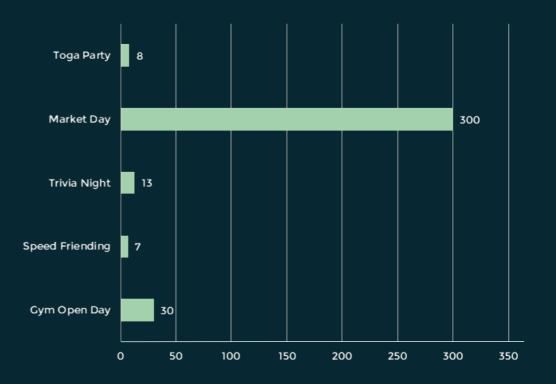
The online Speed Friending event remained to ensure remote students could participate and meet people. The social inclusion of this cohort is important to JCUSA.

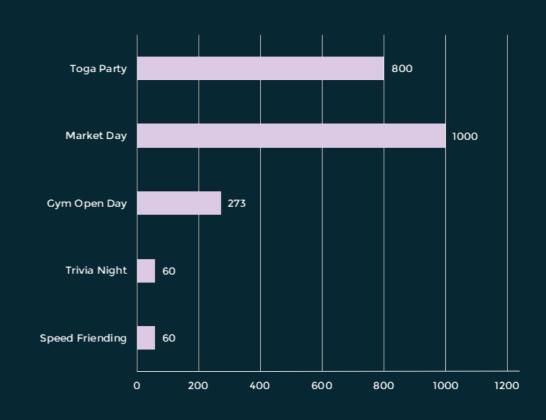

O Week Social Events - Townsville Campus Participation Numbers: Semester 2/2022

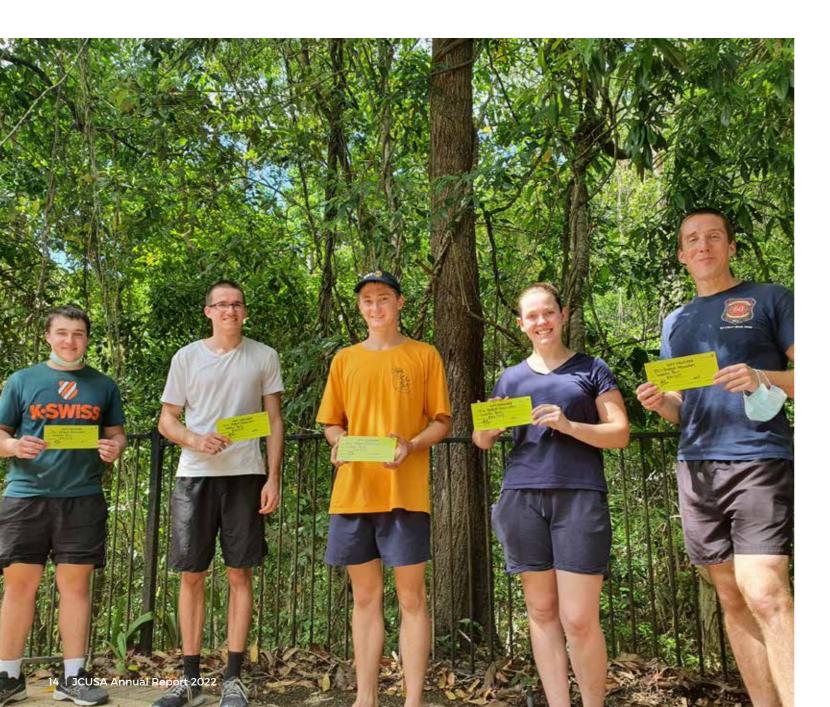

Market Day in Semester 2, 2022

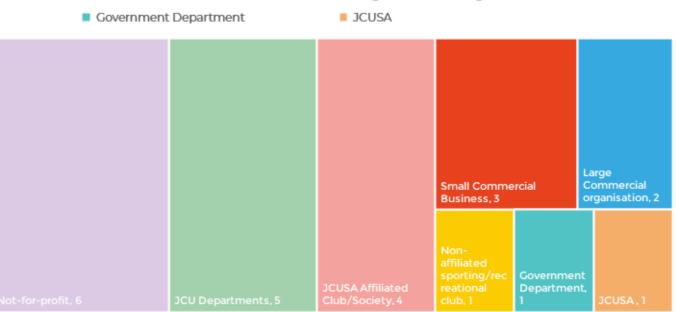

Staff Movements

2022 saw the addition of a temporary Student Advocacy Officer between March 2022 and December 2022. Unfortunately, the additional funding provided by JCU for this role is not to be continued in 2023.

The Bullsheet

The President of the James Cook University Student Association, whom is the appointed proprietor and publisher of the "Bullsheet" for the purpose of the Printers and Publishers Act 1981 manages The Bullsheet.

The student publication continued with the online presence that commenced in 2020 and limited, mandatory print editions.

The Editor continued to source material and generate contributions from the student cohort.

SSAF is utilised to fund The Bullsheet under the legislation as the funding is being used to "Support the production and dissemination to students of media whose content is provided by students".

Free Breakfast/Brunch

JCUSA was fortunate again in receiving SSAF funding for the Free Breakfast/Brunch initiative on both the Cairns and Townsville Campus.

There is a great deal of research that demonstrates that breakfast is the most important meal of the day, and this is especially the case for brains that are still developing. As a certain percentage of students may not be able to afford breakfast or others that chose to skip breakfast, the Free Breakfast/Brunch program ensures that some student get the opportunity to eat something.

Breakfast is important for the student cohort as it:

- · assists in maintaining a healthy weight;
- provides energy and essential nutrients; and

• improves alertness, concentration, mental performance, mood and memory.

Free breakfast/brunch is aligned to the promotion of health and welfare of the students and is an allowable SSAF category under: providing food or drink to students on a campus of the higher education provider.

The use of SSAF clearly meets the legislative requirements of "providing food or drink to students on a campus of the higher education provider" and "promoting the health and welfare of students".

Students continue to actively attend, support and benefit from this free food event.

Clubs and Societies

Clubs and Societies continue to play an active role on the campuses and they provide a great experience to students. JCUSA is committed to supporting these clubs and societies and equitably distributing SSAF funded grants to them.

The total number of affiliated clubs/societies remained similar to 2020 as COVID was still impacting the number of students actually on campus and the management of events. It is anticipated that with the return of face to face lectures that the number of students on campus will increase and hence in turn increase affiliation numbers.

In 2022 eligible clubs/societies benefited from grants totalling \$27,106.18 and \$2,013.73 was returned unspent.

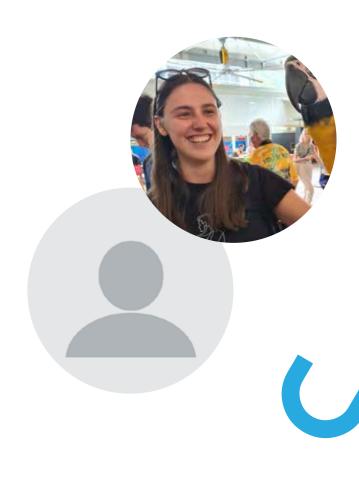

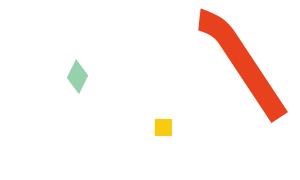

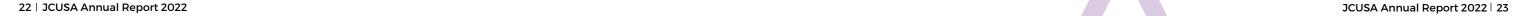

Student Advocate

We are a team of Student Advocacy Officers that provide an independent, free, confidential and non-judgemental service to all James Cook University students across all domestic campuses. Students are not required to be a member of JCUSA to access our Advocacy Service. Our role is funded through the Student Services and Amenities

In 2022, the Advocacy team consisted of five members: 2 in Townsville: 2 in Cairns and 1 in Brisbane:

- Catherine Wyle Townsville;
- Madelaine Keogh Townsville;
- Kimberly Thornley Cairns;
- Julie Caswell Cairns; and
- Gian Corpuz Brisbane.

Our Advocates assist all JCU students enrolled through all domestic campuses regardless of their study mode or campus location, including all external students and those located in remote study centres such as Mt Isa; Mackay; Darwin, and Thursday Island.

Our main service area is Academic Advocacy and we provide limited welfare support. The nature of the Academic Advocacy services offered seeks to:

- empower students to understand and act on their rights and responsibilities through the provision of timely advice;
- provide information on general James Cook University related questions and
- assist in clarifying JCU policies and procedures or official correspondence from the University and how to respond;
- support and accompany students to meetings with JCU staff/ or in some cases represent students at University hearings;
- support, represent and advocate for students in relation to academic misconduct and appeals to ensure the student's voice is heard.

Our Advocates also provide Welfare Support to students who require information, support, and referrals to both internal and external services



COVID

The COVID-19 pandemic continued to cause some disruption throughout 2022 but lessened toward the latter part of the year where campus life began returning to pre-COVID normal. Our Advocates continued to assist students with some minor changes to our service delivery. Advocates continued to assist students via Zoom and telephone in 2022, but also resumed some face-toface appointments. Despite the disruptions caused by COVID, the Advocates were able to maintain a high level of service delivery and commitment to JCU students, as such 2022 was again a busy and productive year for the Advocates.

Student Advocacy Report

Case Management

The distribution of cases fluctuates across the main campuses (Brisbane, Cairns, and Townsville) due to variance in student enrolments; differences in the teaching calendar and presence of advocacy support on campus. Each matter is recorded based on the student's location not the advocate's location. Between 2020 and 2022 there were a total of 15,224 active cases with JCUSA Advocacy Service. This indicates a 40% increase in student numbers in the last 12 months.

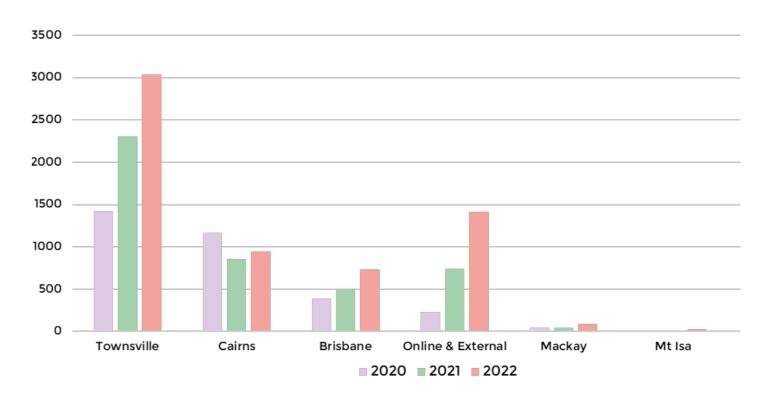


Total cases 2020 to 2022

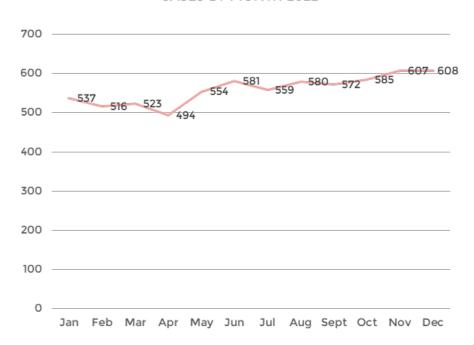

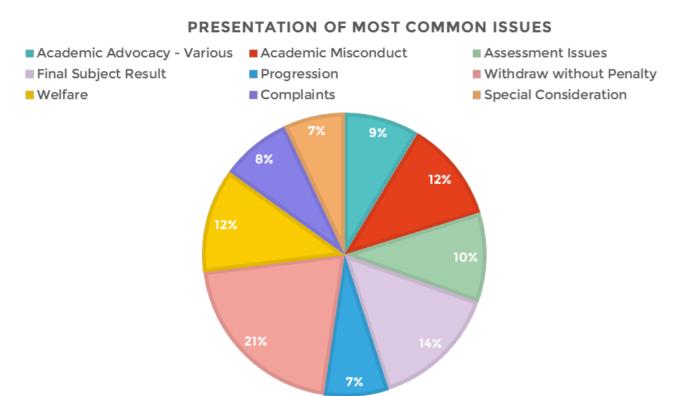

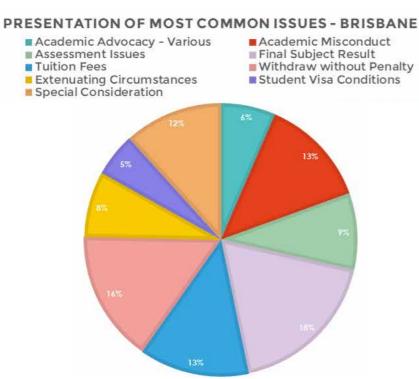
Since the impact of COVID, many students have either chosen or been required to study online or externally if these were the only options available to them. Online and External students accessing the Advocacy service have risen by more than 512% since 2020.

Students initially present with one issue but more may arise as the case progresses. Approximately 88% of our caseload was academic related matters, with approximately 12% being welfare issues. The most common issues generated in 2022 were:

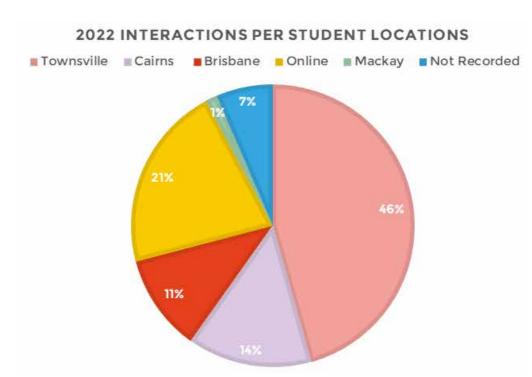


Withdrawal without penalty matters remained the majority of matters the advocate manage at near a quarter of all cases. The Advocates experienced numerous denied applications with concerns surrounding the reasons for the decisions particularly from JCU Student Finance. This led to the General Manager raising concerns with JCU on the advocates' behalf to try to improve the outcomes for students in these matters. This was raised in September 2022. Despite no formal response, the advocates have witnessed an increasing improvement in the outcomes, however, there remains room for further improvement.

The Advocates also began tracking the most common issues presented specifically for the Brisbane Campus:



At the conclusion of 2022; a total of 17,130 interactions had been made across all campuses, which is relatively the same count as 2021. The distribution of students who sought assistance was 46% located in Townsville; 14% located in Cairns; 21% online students, 11% in Brisbane, 1% in Mackay, while 7% did not record their campus.



Referrals to JCU support services, external support services and legal professionals are made on a needs-basis throughout the year. Previously Advocates were able to provide students with emergency food or fuel vouchers if assessed as being in need.

Unfortunately, due to significant funding cuts and the financial impact of COVID, JCUSA has been unable to provide this support since March 2020. Interactions with students comprise of emails; face-to-face (including zoom) and phone calls. June 2022 spiked to a peak of 2038 interactions due to an increase in students requiring assistance with academic misconduct hearings; appeals of final subject result; and withdrawal without financial penalty. Interactions were recorded above 1000 per month for the entire year making 2022 equally as busy for the advocates as 2021.

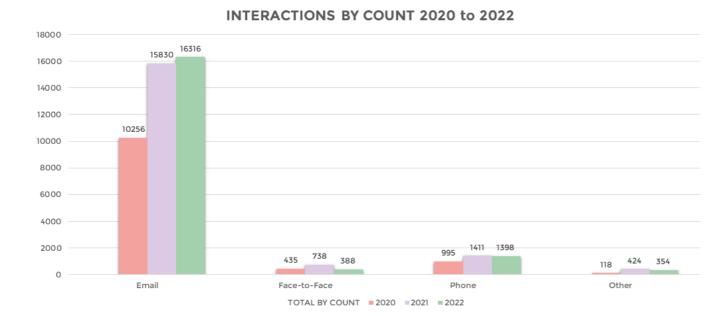

Email is still the preferred method of contact by students comprising 95% of interactions. There has been a significant increase of email (59%) and phone (40%) interactions from 2020 (pre-COVID) to 2022.

There was a noted decline in face-to-face interactions from 2021 to 2022 of 47%. This would be a combination of location and increased preference for email or phone. Both students and advocates prefer the flexibility and efficiency these modes of contact provide hence the fluctuation.



The Advocates implemented a Student Outcomes category to our data analysis to try to capture the outcomes obtained for students who sought assistance through the advocacy service. Advocates have been consistently able to achieve more favourable outcomes for students. Cases that have no outcome recorded at present are still open files.

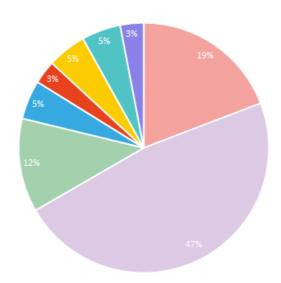

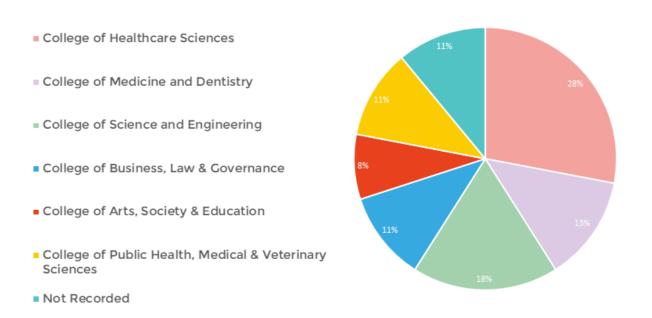

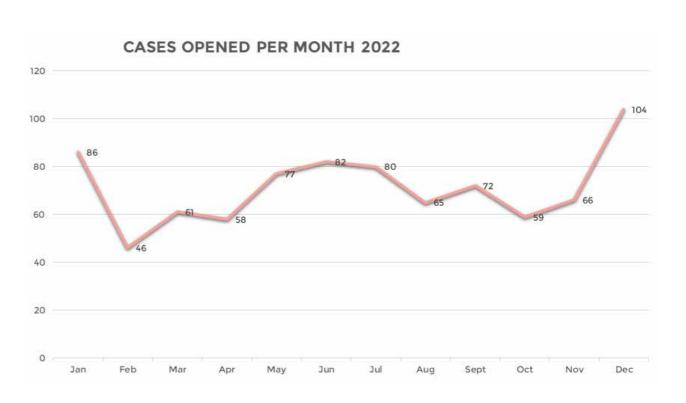


The Advocates also implemented the tracking of the number of cases from individual Colleges across all campuses.

The Advocates also implemented tracking of cases opened and closed each month across 2022. The cases peaked in January, June and most notably in December. This is due to review of final subject result matters and review of academic progression outcomes (i.e. exclusion) with new students accessing the service. Advocates always maintain an existing case file load that carries over month to month.

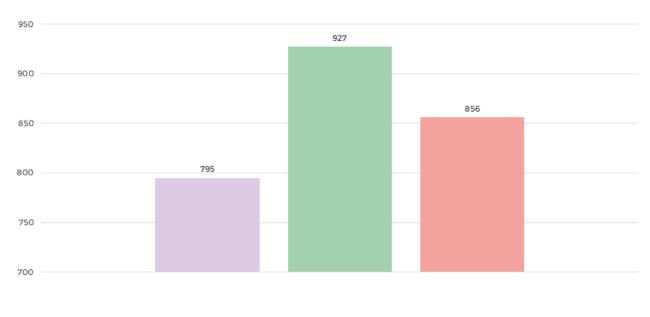

The advocates can go back to see the difference between the years as well as new cases being opened per year. Between 2020 and 2021 there was a 17% increase reported. Then between 2021 and 2022 there was 8% decline. 2022 was still 8% higher than 2020 though.

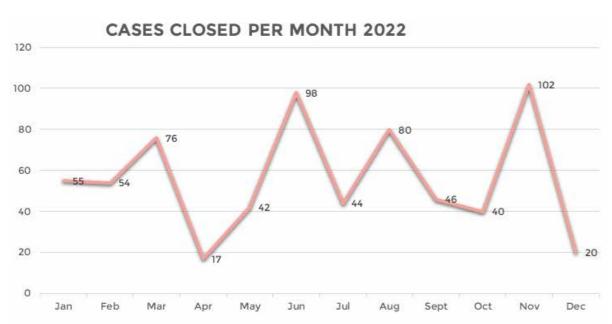




The Advocates did the same for cases that were closed per month across 2022. The amount of cases closed is relative usually to the advocate's ability to manage case files.

Some matters can be closed relatively quickly if for example advice or referral, others carry over many months depending on their complexity or until the advocate deems the case no longer active based on lack of student communication/engagement with the service.

Toward the latter part of 2022, UniOne released a change in the case management system's capabilities whereby the number of emails stored per case file was increased.

Prior to this change, only 50 emails could be recorded within one case file which led advocates having to open numerous files (dependent on how many emails sent/ received in matter) for the one case which increased the overall number of case files despite still technically only being one student matter.

The change increased this limit to 250 emails per file. This effectively meant that the advocates could record 5 times the number of emails in each file which would reduce the overall case file numbers and demand on the advocate's case management. This was a significant positive change for the Advocates.

Overall, 2022 was another busy year for the advocates with continued increase in workloads. The increase in workload has resulted in the Advocates making attempts to advocate for further resourcing from JCU.

The General Manager made significant efforts in this space on behalf of the Advocates. The General Manager's business case presented to JCU resulted in temporary increased funding for an additional full-time position for 2022 which was shared between two part-time advocates.

Julie Caswell joined the team in February 2022 for 3 days per week until December 2022; and our Brisbane based Advocate, Gian Corpuz, was able to take on the additional 2 days per week seamlessly.

This immediately started to reduce some pressure on the other advocates. However, the workload still remained excessive. The advocates hold concerns for what 2023 will bring when this funding comes to an end.

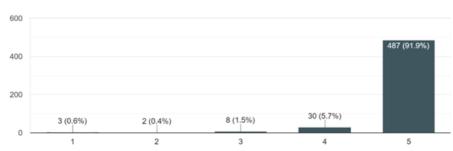


Student Feedback of Advocacy Service

The Advocates implemented a Student Feedback Survey in 2020 to capture student satisfaction with the service. The survey was designed to be quick and simple to complete, taking about 2-3 minutes and is completely anonymous.

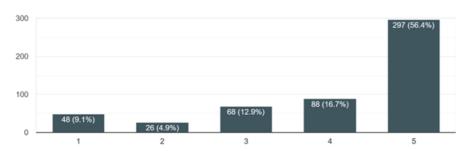
We received 174 responses in 2022 and 530 responses from the creation of the survey to the end of 2022. This equates to approximately 24% of students provided with the survey link completing the survey with 719 cases being closed in 2022. The feedback survey link is provided through the JCUSA website and emailed to students when their files are closed. Students were overwhelmingly satisfied and supportive of the Advocacy Service.

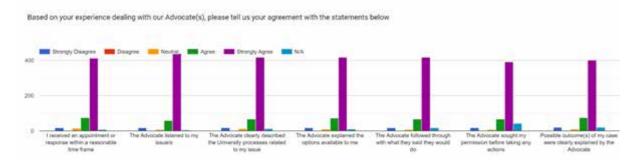
The survey allows the Advocates to contrast the satisfaction levels with the advocate's assistance to the outcomes obtained from JCU.

The survey also asked students to rate their agreement with a number of statements. Again, the feedback was overwhelmingly positive.

As a result of student feedback and increased workload, we will be advocating for additional funding to try to expand our service.



Other Duties of the Advocates

Additionally, advocates have an ongoing presence in other informal meetings and sessions facilitated by either colleges or individual groups. The aim is to support and enhance the students overall learning experience at JCU. The level of interactions is not limited to meeting with key departments or colleges to ensure efficient cooperation and referrals are made including presentation workshops of our role to student support staff members, mentors, postgraduate students and the Indigenous Education and Research Centre. Our Advocates also consult on JCU Policy and Procedure reviews. 2022 marked the year that advocates across the nation came together to discuss advocacy on a national collective level which the JCUSA advocates were a part of. The advocates intend to work with other advocacy services to implement a national body for Advocacy through working groups.

The Advocates take an active part within the JCU community and assist and participate in events across the Campus including: O-Week; Stress Less: and Exam Plan.

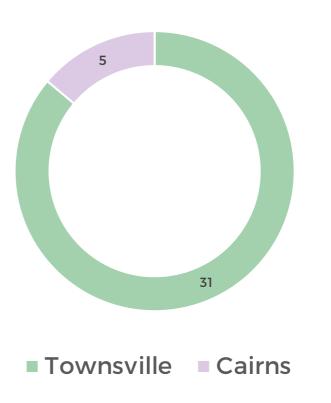

Total number of affiliated Clubs/Societies

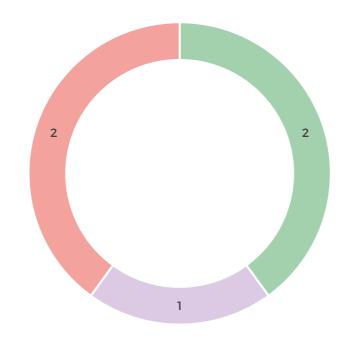

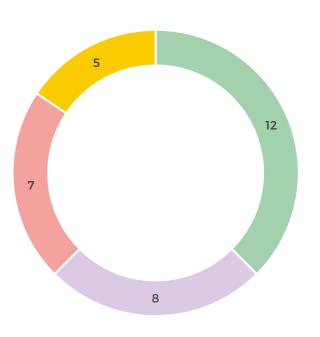

2022 has been a challenging year for JCUSA Sport & Recreation. We have gone through some highs and lows for the year however are happy to reflect on the year that was.

Over the past couple of years, JCU has been quite fortunate to be able to have students on campus and be involved in sport & recreation programs unlike our fellow universities located in NSW, ACT & Victoria due to lockdowns with COVID-19. At the beginning of the year, we and the rest of Queensland were cautious going in 2022 with the virus being part of the community which is something that none of us have not seen since the beginning of the pandemic in 2020.

Whilst there was that caution and continuing to monitor for symptoms, close contacts and mask wearing, there was still a lot of eagerness and excitement going into the year. State and territory borders reopened, international borders were open once again which allowed students from all over the world come to JCU or in some cases, return to their university. We were able to hold events for International students, we saw students back on campus interacting with one another and more importantly, our programs returned once again including some of the larger sporting events around the country.

We also saw some changes when it came to staffing in Sport & Recreation. Our previous sport & recreation programs officer Jacob Day left in February this year who moved down to Brisbane. We appreciated Jacob's service to the Student Association. A replacement took over two months to find which couldn't have been at the worst time particularly with O Week and Social Sport around the corner. Luckily we were able to find Jesse Barnard to fill Jacob's role as the Sport & Recreation Programs Officer who has been a great asset to the team. In addition, we also employed a second programs officer in Townsville with Summer Jones joining the team in July.

Much like Jesse, Summer has been a valuable asset to the team throughout 2022. There were also staffing changes in Cairns as well as our Sport & Recreation Officer Brenton Ricci moving on in April to move to Norway. Brenton has been with the organisation for a



number of years and we appreciate his services to the Student Association of the years. We are lucky to now have Chaim Taylor as our Sport & Recreation Officer. Chaim has been working in our gym for a number of years as well so we are glad to find someone who can fill Brenton's shoes.

Cairns Social Sport

In 2022, Cairns Social Sport had 6-a-side Soccer and touch football played across both semesters. These sports were held on Wednesday nights. While only a small number participated in the program, it was great to see students willing to be involved in the program. There have been issues with the field lights as they are beginning to fail which have affected Social Sport. We are in continual discussions with the university to look at the possibility of upgrading the facilities on the JCU Oval.

Gunyarra Cup

In just its fifth year of existence, the Gunyarra Cup our residential college competition returned. Whilst the program started slow we started to see the program build towards the end of the year particularly with 6-a-side soccer, touch football and basketball. In the end John Grey Hall were able to reclaim the cup after narrowly losing it in 2021. One event we were most proud in the Gunyarra Cup was the Cross Country event. JCUSA Sport & Recreation partnered with Kick On a Not-For-Profit Charity that helps raise the awareness of mental health.

Cairns Gym

The JCU Fit 101 facility celebrated 12 months since it first opened on campus which shows how quick time comes around. We continued to maintain the same number of memberships from 2021 which was around 200. Whilst it is a good start to the JCU Fit 101, we would like to have more people join the facility. The vast majority of our members are 12 month memberships who use the facility. JCU Fit 101 once again was used by the Cairnsbased Northern Rays players. We also at the beginning of 2022 allowed Fitness Passport holders to come along and use the facility which also opens up a new group of people to use the facility.

Uni v Navy

We were proud to hold the Uni v Navy again in 2022 which it went into its second year. While JCU had a small but enthusiastic team that did not stop us from winning the indoor soccer, European handball and netball competitions meanwhile the Navy won both Indoor Cricket and Beach Volleyball. We hope to have more students involved in the Uni v Navy event for 2023.

Townsville

Social Sport

With return to the normal world, we saw Social Sport in Townsville grow back to pre-covid numbers as we had 96 teams compete across the 2022 year which is the best numbers since 2018. We are seeing that students want the variety as more students are part of the rounders program where participants play a different sport each week.

We also had Lacrosse Australia come up to

We also had Lacrosse Australia come up to the Townsville Campus on some nights of Social Sport to showcase their sport to a new generation of participants.

Winna Shield

Our residential college competition went under a name change in 2022 as the competition is now called Winna Shield. Winna in the Bindal language means fish which better reflects the tropics of North Queensland. The Winna Shield program saw the newest halls of residence join the competition in Burralga Yumba.

John Flynn College continued to their overall dominance winning the Overall Trophy for the 5th straight year beating out first timers Burralga Yumba. John Flynn College also won the men's overall meanwhile Burralga Yumba won the women's overall. Saints Catholic College continued their streak for the Spirit Award as they won it for the 6th straight year. In the Winna Shield competition, Kellie Spicer from John Flynn College won the Winna Shield Sportswoman of the Year meanwhile Roma Tuisolia from George Roberts Hall won Sportsman of the Year.

Interfaculty Sport

Interfaculty Sport is also the only free program on offer to JCU students in Townsville. Students will compete across table tennis, touch football, soccer, basketball, netball and rugby league to be crowned overall Interfaculty Champions.

Interfaculty Sport continues to grow not only in participation, but also the awareness that program exists on campus.

Interfaculty Sport was the closest finish we have seen in the program as both Rehabilitation and Exercise Science also known as RESSA and Vet Science were unable to be separated therefore both faculties were named joint Interfaculty Sport Champions!

JCUSA Fitness Centre

2022 was a difficult year for the JCUSA Fitness Centre. To an extent, we are somewhat still feeling the effects from COVID-19 however we are also seeing that the equipment and what we offer on campus needs a facelift to ensure that not only the JCUSA Fitness Centre is not only financially viable but we are also enchancing the experience for members.

Throughout 2023, we had over 1100 members use the JCUSA Fitness Centre with our most popular type of gym membership being the 12 Month Membership and the Academic Year (40 weeks) membership. The Fitness Passport program continues to be a key partnership with Fitness Passport holders wanting to use the

The Group Fitness Classes were still a popular service to have on campus. We had over 800 classes over 2022 with over 4400 participants throughout these classes. On average participants per class, Zumba were the most popular classes followed by Pilates and Thump. Body Pump was also the most common class with 337 classes in 2022 followed by Cycle at 106. Afternoon/evening classes tended to be the most popular time to come in particular the 4:30pm and 5:45pm classes. Other classes held included GRIT Series, Yoga, Strong 30, Zumba, and Core.

Uni v Armv

Our annual JCU Uni v Army event was back on the cards once again in 2022! A major event in the Townsville region that gathers a lot of publicity in the lead up to the day.

The one-day competition was expanded to

include mixed netball into the program. After the inaugural match, it felt like it was netbrawl instead of netball due to the physicality. However the intensity, rivalry and excitement ensures that this match will be around long term. Happy to advise that JCU did win that clash.

There was a slight change to the women's and men's soccer clash as the Army sides were not available on that day however we were fortunate enough to have Riverway JCU Football Club as a replacement for these matches with JCU winning the women's match and Riverway JCU winning the men's clash. JCU was able to win the JCU Commander's Cup women rugby union clash. The Army were able to score early to lead 5-0 however the JCU were able to gain the lead before halftime.

In the second half, the Army started strong to score two tries which looked like they were going to win the clash for the third straight time.

With one more play of the game, JCUs Genya Doherty was able to run 100 metres going past multiple players to score underneath the posts to help JCU reclaim the JCU Commander's Cup for the first time since 2018.

Representative Sports

University Nationals

For the first time since 2019, UniSport Nationals was held in its full capacity. With all the rising costs and inflation occurring in Australia this year, it would be fitting that the event was to take place in of all places Perth, Western Australia. Despite being cheaper to fly to London return, JCU were able to send 34 students from Cairns, Townsville and online to the event which attracted over 5,000 competitors. JCU competed in basketball, beach volleyball, netball, rugby 7s, swimming and fencing. It was a long 8 days of competition however the long days of hard work, sleepless hours and encouragement, it was worth it in the end.

Despite travelling further than any other university, we showed we were not there to make up the numbers. JCU were able to win their first gold medal since 2019 in the women's

pair's beach volleyball defeating the University of Western Australia in the final. What makes the win even better is that they lost to the same team in the earlier rounds. The team made up of Shannon Wong and Irish Espanola gave them a false sense of hope.

JCU were also able to claim a silver medal in women's rugby 7s. While the team went down to the University of Sydney in the Gold Medal match, the semi-final clash with Charles Sturt University was one of the games of the tournament. As JCUs bogey team for a number of years, the two teams played out an even semi-final with the game going into overtime however with how long we were playing in the second half, it was like the ladies had played another entire half. Despite being on their last legs, JCU found a breakthrough in captain Lucy Lloyd-Morgan who fended away 3 players to run 80m down the sideline to score in the corner and guaranteeing JCU a medal!

We didn't stop there with the medals either. On the final day, our women's netball team were also able to claim a bronze medal at the Division 2 competition defeating the University of Wollongong in the bronze medal clash. It was an even hotly contested match with the margin being 5 points or less for the entire game, JCU were able to take an early lead and played one of their best games of the tournament to hold onto the victory.

We also had success in fencing where our sole representative Adam Reynolds made the quarter finals and the round of 16 in the foil and epee competitions, our swimmer Anthony Reppel competed in 5 events across 3 days of competition swimming a personal best in three of his events. Our men's pairs beach volleyball team were unfortunate not to claim a bronze medal going down to Griffith University.

Just to give you more information on how well we did, overall, JCU finished 16th out of 43 universities and institutions. This is JCUs best finish since 2012 and is also JCUs fourth best ever finish at UniSport Nationals since the competition first began in 1993. In fact, amongst all of the universities in the North Region which comprises of Queensland and Northern NSW, JCU finished 3rd overall with only Bond University and the University of Queensland beating us.

Whilst we can talk about how well we did in terms of medals and positions, the big win however was that the JCU team was there as one team. Regardless of the sport, how well they did and how many students knew each other, everyone that represented JCU at UniSport Nationals got along, rode the lows and the highs which has helped build this culture not only for this year but for future years to come. Everyone of them should be proud with themselves on how they represented the university.

Next year's Nationals event will be held back at its spiritual home of the Gold Coast. JCUSA Sport & Recreation want to send one of the largest teams ever to nationals in 2023 with plans to have upwards of 150+ students as not only the students who went away enjoyed themselves, but other students including future JCU students see what has occurred and want to be part of this legacy.

Indigenous Nationals

The 2022 Indigenous Nationals event was held in Brisbane hosted by Queensland University of Technology. Without the worry of being locked out of the state, it was a great to see a national event be held in its full capacity since 2019. From the beginning of the event, we saw the excitement from everyone knowing that universities all over Australia wanted to be part of the event. Lucky enough JCU had a team in this prestigious event. The JCU team was made up of students located in Cairns, Townsville and Thursday Island. Of the four sports contested at the event, basketball, touch football, netball and volleyball, volleyball was JCUs top event. JCU made it to the Quarter Finals however they were beaten by a very good University of Queensland side. JCU showed that when it comes to volleyball, they are always a power-

JCUSA Sport Nationals Representative Program

The 2022 JCUSA Sport Nationals Representative Program went to Shannon Wong (beach volleyball), Prue Peters (rugby 7s), Adam Reynolds (fencing) and Georgia Chambers (athletics). The JCUSA Sport Nationals Representative Program sees subsided travel for JCU Students to represent their University at a National level.

Georgia Chambers would compete in the 1500m finishing 11th as well as the 5000m where she finished in the fourth position at UniSport Athletics Nationals. We also had second competitor which was Annabel Lee who also competed in the 5000m finishing in 9th position. We also added four more awards in 2022 to event with Best Small Club of the Year which went to the JCU Townsville Beach Volleyball Club, Club of the Year which went to Riverway JCU Football Club, Coach of the Year which went to Campbell Yates (Rugby Union) and Team of the Year which was won by the JCU Women's Pairs Beach Volleyball Team.

UniSport MyWay Program

In 2022, we received funding from UniSport Australia as part of the MyWay Program. The program was aligned with Sport Australia which is increasing participation in sport & recreation around the country. As part of the program, we held in Townsville a one-day competition was sanctioned by Queensland Rugby League and was also supported by the Townsville District Rugby League.

On the night of the competition, Vet Science went undefeated to go on to be women's rugby league 9s champions. In Cairns, we also delivered an Interfaculty Sport program allowed students to compete for the relevant faculty in a one day event.

We played a variety of sports including basketball, table tennis, soccer, spikeball and more. With both events, Dentistry were able to claim the overall champions.

We also had Lacrosse Australia come and hold Come & Try sessions at Social Sport in Cairns and Townsville to increase participation in the North Queensland region.

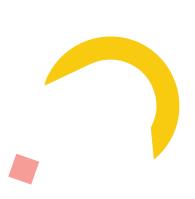

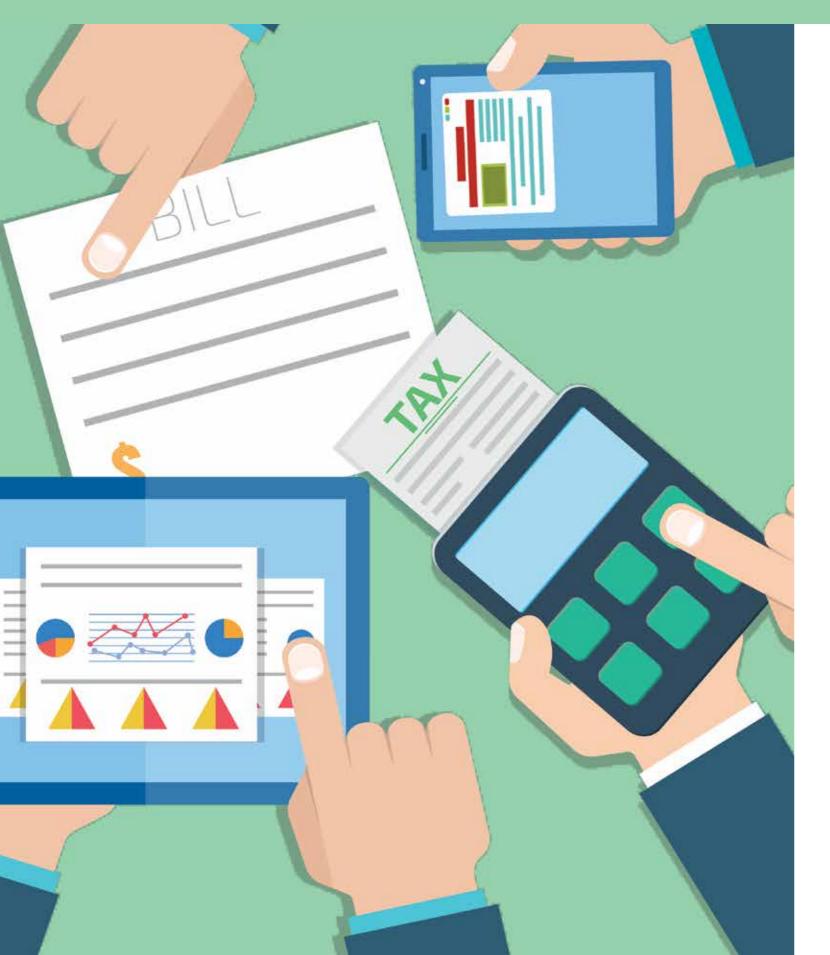

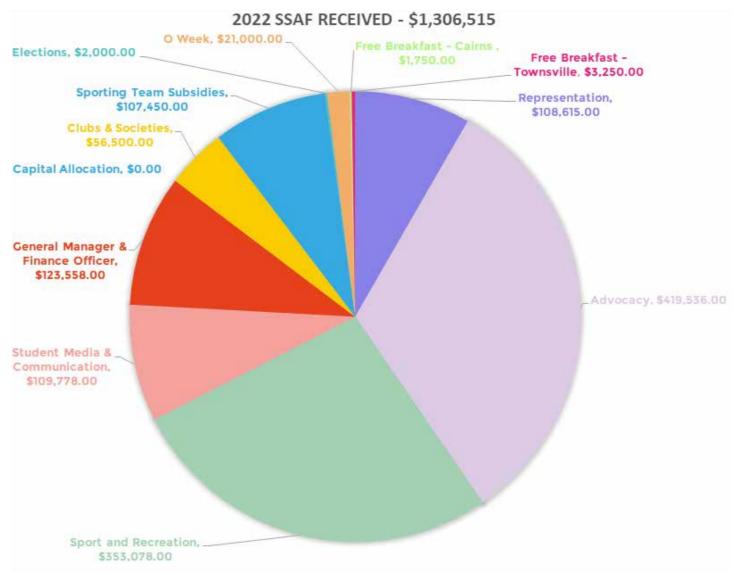


Each year the Chair of JCU's Student Services and Amenities Fee Income Allocation Working Group consults with JCU student representatives, through the JCU Student Association Council regarding priorities for expenditure of the proceeds of the SSA Fee income.

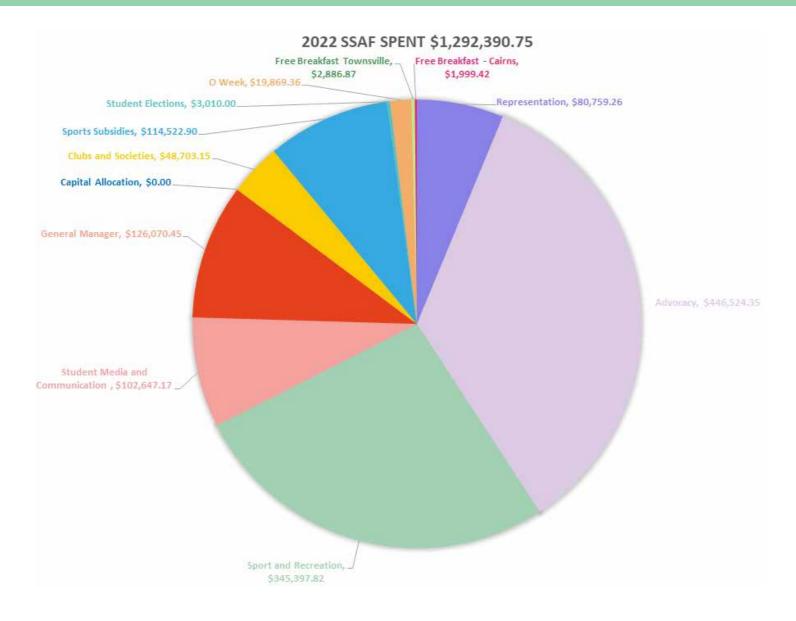
The broader student body is consulted through various channels such as the SSAF Survey, Student Advisory Forums, pop up Student Kiosks and various workshops and committees.

SSAF funds are required to be spent on activities and facilities that comply with Higher Education Support Act 2003. Unspent funds for the year are returned to the University's SSAF holding account to be disbursed as per the requirements of the above mentioned Act.

In 2022, JCUSA received a total of \$1,306,515.00 in SSAF Funds via a bid process. This is a reduction from 2021 when JCUSA received a total of \$1,455,245.00.

Advocacy

\$446,524.35

This funding was utilised for the provision of student support services which included:

- Academic advocacy for all JCU students;
- General information on how the University operates which also including University academic policies and procedures;
- Free and confidential services to assist with academic concerns;
- Representation, advice and support for students that are consulting with the University or individual lecturers;
- Assistance with preparation of application for deferred exams, special consideration of for a request for a review of assessment;
- Advocacy events; and
- Professional development and any associated travel.

The budget for Advocacy also includes the cost of software specifically utilised for case management, professional development, year planners and advocacy campaigns.

Representation

\$80,759.26

Funding was utilised for:

- Honorarium payments to Councillors;
- Awareness campaigns held by Councillors; and
- Student Council operating costs such as printing, Induction, Council meeting expenses, training, WHS costs and legal fees.

Media and Communication

\$102,647.17

This funding was utilised to have a Media and Marketing Officer at the JCUSA, which is a fulltime position.

Funds are also used for:

- Our student publication The Bullsheet;
- Wages for The Bullsheet Editor and Graphic Designer;
- O'Week;

- Printing expenses and operating costs;
- Marketing, graphic design and communication strategies for the JCUSA such as the website and Facebook; and
- Professional development.

General Manager and Finance Officer

\$126,070.45

This funding was utilised for:

- Finance Officers salary;
- Subsidising GM Wages (JCUSA pays remainder);
- Administrative costs such as IT licenses, printer leases, financial software costs;
- Professional development;
- Travel; and
- Other costs associated with the operations of the Association.

Clubs and Societies

\$48,703.15

Grants were provided to clubs and societies for events, food and drink on campus, administration costs for running their entity, merchandise and marketing, guest presenters, field hire, equipment and various other items for events they held.

The costs of insurance also sits within the budget allocation for Clubs and Societies.

A breakdown of this area includes:

- Insurance for Clubs and Societies in 2022 was \$22,479 (ex GST);
- Total Grants issued \$25,122;
- Uni Moves App; and
- Other Expenses such as BBQ maintenance, servicing and gas.

JCUSA received \$20,000 in SSAF for the 2 O Weeks held on both the Townsville and Cairns Campus and had an underspend of \$130.64.

Free Breakfast

\$4.886.29

JCUSA received \$5,000 in SSAF funding for Free Breakfasts and JCUSA then split that amount to create a budget.

Free Breakfast for Townsville utilised \$2,886.87 of SSAF and there was an underspend of \$363.13.

Free breakfast Cairns utilised \$1,999.42 in SSAF with an over spend of \$249.42.

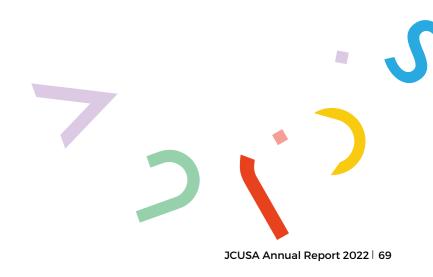

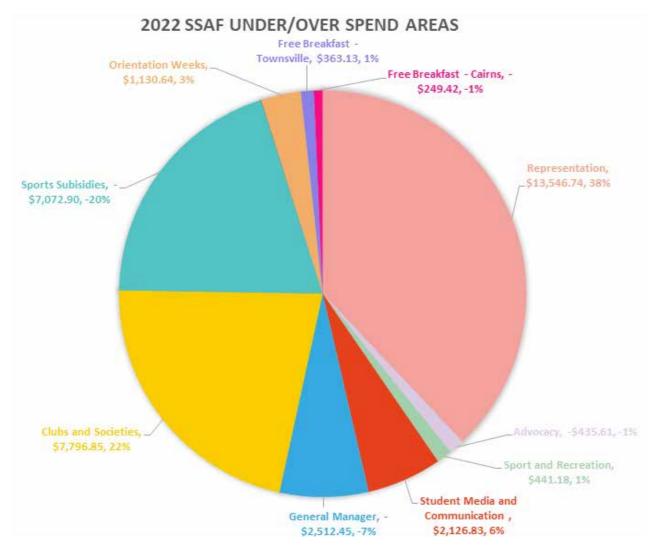

The JCU Student Association has a number of bank accounts that serve specific purposes and are held with various financial institutions. There are also 2 Pay Pal Accounts and 1 Stripe Account

The SSAF income is credited to a specific account and then these funds are transferred over to the JCUSA working account after SSAF expenses have been incurred.

The Pay Pal and Stripe accounts are utilised to capture deposits from memberships and sporting events.

All JCUSA accounts have the President, Vice President, General Manager and Finance Officer as signatories and financial transactions are authorised by two signatories.

The Student Association has reduced the number of Corporate Credit Cards that are issued to staff. The cards are used to make small purchases in an efficient manner.
