

One of the focuses for the College has been student attendance. As a whole College, our aim is to achieve an attendance rate of 95% and above. It is important to acknowledge that certain circumstances can affect student attendance.

However, it is important that we continue to strive to achieve our benchmark; research suggests that a settled learning environment, where students are in class as much as possible, is significant in providing the best opportunity for positive learning outcomes. We believe that efforts at reducing absenteeism will help improve academic results at the College. Furthermore, building resilience within our students is important in fostering a strong capacity for them to prosper in all aspects of their lives. It is our desire that your child has the best opportunity to develop their potential in all aspects of their life at the College.

As part of the College's approach to improving attendance, in the coming weeks parents/guardians will be receiving a SEQTA notification, and/or a request for a meeting, for any student whose attendance was below 80% in Term 1

Punctuality

Punctuality in any environment, work, sport, or school, is important and is an area that the College continues to challenge students to meet expectations - arriving to both class and Homeroom on time. Students being late to school and classes has a significant impact on their education due to missed class time, as the table below shows.

WHAT SORT OF START IS YOUR CHILD GETTING?

Did you know your child's best learning time is the start of the school day? That's when every minute counts the most!

Every day, every moment counts in the life of every child at our school.

Study Skills: SET TIMES FOR HOME LEARNING

PARENTS: Many students come home from school and end up just waiting until they might 'feel' like doing schoolwork. Or else they drag everything out over the whole night. A much better way is each night have set allocated times for home learning. Many students find that learning in 20-30 minute blocks works well for them. During this time students should do homework first, then work on any assignments or upcoming tests, then use the rest of the time allocated for schoolwork to complete independent learning activities such as reviewing work they find difficult, making study notes or doing practice questions to build their skills. All distractions should be removed during this time, so students learn to focus for 20-30 minute blocks of time. It is a great idea to make a timetable of the home learning and place it on the fridge so everyone is clear when students are focusing and when they are doing other activities or having free time.

STUDENTS: Some of the benefits for students of having set times allocated for home learning are:

- You are more likely to learn at home if you know when to start and when to end.
- You will be more effective when you remove distractions and learn to focus for 20-30 minute blocks.
- In all the times NOT allocated to schoolwork you can do whatever you like without feeling guilty about it.
- Having set times stops arguments between students and parents as everyone has agreed when the timeslots allocated to students will be.
- You know that you are definitely doing enough work for school.
- Keeping your home learning and personal life separate means you will be able to manage






In Year 9 History students are studying the Industrial Revolution; these maps were drawn by hand and simulate the growth and changes that occurred during this time, with students starting their drawings with just one house and a river and quickly expanding their work to create an entire city.

In Year 10 Pre-English Literature Studies students produced plot timelines as part of their novel study of the classic text 'To Kill a Mockingbird' incorporating quotes, pictures and key moments from the novel into their timeline.

Students in Year 7 Humanities have created these impressive magazine covers dating back to Ancient Persia as part of their first history unit, while in Year 11 Pre English-Literature Studies woodwork has been incorporated into the study of Macbeth, with students creating a prop to be used in their creative assessment task as part of their unit on Shakespeare.

The Stage 2 Outdoor Education class arrived from Darwin to Sydney and drove to Jamberoo action park for a few hours of fun before we got to the surf camp. We went on some impressive water slides, tobogganing, chair lift and finished it off with choosing one of the many places to eat within the park. We made the local IGA our friend and supplied ourselves and our cabin with numerous snacks. When first arriving to the camp all the instructors were very welcoming and the class ended up building good relationships with them by the end. We were given our own wetsuits to use for the trip with quirky names on them to identify ourselves.

The classes view of 7-mile beach was breathtaking, it was such a beautiful location on the NSW south coast. We would learn to become very familiar with the walk to the beach which took about 10 minutes from our accommodation. Each lesson we had to go and collect our surfboards and our instructors helped teach us a few techniques on how to make carrying the large boards easier.

Before each surf session there would be an introduction on what we would do in each session and a fun warm up game to get our bodies ready. These warm up games made us laugh and grow closer together as a class. We played tip, everyone's it and a new game were we had teams and dug under a surfboard until people could fit under it. Everyone one in the team had to tunnel under.

On the first session we learnt about how to get up on the board and spent the two hour session focusing on that, the second session we learnt about speeding up and slowing down, in the third session we learnt how to turn and in the fourth session we learnt how to read the waves and how it affects the surf (wind, tide and current) and In the fourth session we found out that our group was stuck in a rip. On the fifth and final session we had some fun with learning tricks like sitting down on the board, hand standing, head standing and doing funny poses. During these five sessions we had seen stingrays and dolphins and got to surf and swim very close to them.

Although the trip was short the memories and skills we learnt will stay with us forever. We cant wait to surf again and use them in the future. Everyone improved and it was exciting to see the surfing skills progress so quickly. We are all excited for our next camp in Term 2.




