Anzac Day is rightly a day in which we remember the people who were affected by a battle in Turkey over a hundred years ago and people who were affected by later wars in which Australians took part. We rightly remember those who were killed in war. We remember those who fought and survived, burdened by the memories of war, of its horrors and its companionship. We also remember the people affected indirectly by war – the families whose son, father and brother died in the war, the wives who lost a husband and the young women a fiancé, the families to whom a father returned wounded in body or spirit, the young women who never married for lack of eligible men, the small communities that lost the young men who could have been their future. It is a time for compassion.

During the First World War, Australia was at war with Germany and Turkey. In 1915 many thousands of soldiers from Australia and New Zealand were in Egypt and Palestine getting ready to attack Turkey. The two armies were known as the ANZACs. This is a name taking the first letters of the words Australian and New Zealand Army Corps.

In the cold grey dawn on the 25th of April in 1915, the ANZACs landed on a small strip of beach at Gallipoli, in Turkey's south. They struggled from small boats onto a narrow strip of beach and began to scale steep cliffs. They were attacking the Turkish soldiers who were high up in the rocky cliffs and hills. The Turks fought back with rifles, machine guns and heavy shells – many of our soldiers were killed.

Victory did not come for the ANZACs. Those who survived the first landing fought on against terrible odds, many more were killed and wounded day by day. Eight months later the remnants of that brave army left Gallipoli leaving behind bodies of thousands of their comrades and taking with them many wounded. But the world began to speak with wonder and admiration for those brave men known as the ANZACs who showed that whatever the odds, whatever the price, they would fight for their friends, their country and for freedom.

Anzac Day was originally designed for returned service men and women to come together and share the spirit of mateship that was formed fighting side by side in the trenches overseas. The day means much more than this today, but celebrating the spirit of mateship, the formation of part of the culture of our country, is still central to this day.

Study Skills: SET TIMES FOR HOME LEARNING

PARENTS: Many students come home from school and end up just waiting until they might 'feel' like doing schoolwork. Or else they drag everything out over the whole night. A much better way is each night have set allocated times for home learning. Many students find that learning in 20-30 minute blocks works well for them. During this time students should do homework first, then work on any assignments or upcoming tests, then use the rest of the time allocated for schoolwork to complete independent learning activities such as reviewing work they find difficult, making study notes or doing practice questions to build their skills. All distractions should be removed during this time, so students learn to focus for 20-30 minute blocks of time. It is a great idea to make a timetable of the home learning and place it on the fridge so everyone is clear when students are focusing and when they are doing other activities or having free time.

STUDENTS: Some of the benefits for students of having set times allocated for home learning are:

- You are more likely to learn at home if you know when to start and when to end.
- You will be more effective when you remove distractions and learn to focus for 20-30 minute blocks.
- In all the times NOT allocated to schoolwork you can do whatever you like without feeling guilty about it.
- Having set times stops arguments between students and parents as everyone has agreed when the timeslots allocated to students will be.
- You know that you are definitely doing enough work for school.
- Keeping your home learning and personal life separate means you will be able to manage

Street Smart High – Thursday 4th of May Periods, Pain, and Endometriosis (PPEP) Talk – Friday 19th of May








Hello Everyone,



Led by Mr. Jones, students headed into Darwin city for the Urban Heat Mitigation Field Trip to conduct field work with professionals from the Darwin City Council and CSIRO. As part of the excursion, students were asked to investigate ways to reduce temperatures in urban contexts, pose questions to experts to extend their understanding of classroom content and record data based on field experiments observations.

The typical hot Darwin day during the field trip only served to underline the importance of reducing urban climates and adopting sustainable cities into our communities!

What's on in the Library?


