Just as we can see Jesus as our brother, we can then welcome Mary as our Mother. Many Catholics have a deep devotion to Mary. We are inspired by her faith, trust, generosity and strength. She was a person, just like us, who loved God with all her being. We invite you to read more about Mary and the reason why we celebrate her birthday in the excerpt below...



The Story of the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary

The Church has celebrated Mary's birth since at least the sixth century. A September birth was chosen because the Eastern Church begins its Church year with September. The September 8 date helped determine the date for the feast of the Immaculate Conception on December 8.

Scripture does not give an account of Mary's birth. However, the apocryphal Protoevangelium of James fills in the gap. This work has no historical value, but it does reflect the development of Christian piety. According to this account, Anna and Joachim are infertile but pray for a child. They receive the promise of a child who will advance God's plan of salvation for the world. Such a story, like many biblical counterparts, stresses the special presence of God in Mary's life from the beginning.

Saint Augustine connects Mary's birth with Jesus' saving work. He tells the earth to rejoice and shine forth in the light of her birth. "She is the flower of the field from whom bloomed the precious lily of the valley. Through her birth the nature inherited from our first parents is changed." The opening prayer at Mass speaks of the birth of Mary's Son as the dawn of our salvation, and asks for an increase of peace.

Top 10 Tips for Dealing with Test and Examination Pressure

1. KNOW YOUR MATERIAL

The more confident you are about the topic(s) in your test, the less stress you will feel come exam time. Make sure you stay on top of your school work and homework throughout the term. Follow up with your teacher, or another subject matter expert, if there are things you don't understand, well before the exams. Trying to understand new concepts the night before a test is very stressful.

2. PRACTISE

Make sure you do practise papers if they are available, or practise questions. This might include multiple choice, short answer or essay style questions. Always study in the way you will be tested. Work out a plan of action so you know how long you are going to allocate to each question type, what question types you will start with and what you will do if you come across things you aren't sure about.

3. FUEL YOUR BODY AND YOUR MIND

In the days leading up to an exam make sure you get enough sleep. Being tired makes it harder to concentrate and remember. Fuel your body and mind by eating well and drinking plenty of water.

4. MANAGE THE PHYSICAL SIGNS OF STRESS

Familiarise yourself with how your body feels when you are stressed. Do you get headaches? Tension in your neck or shoulders? Does your heart race faster? What happens to your breathing? Whenever you feel these effects, quickly start some relaxation exercises. A good one to try during an exam is to breathe in deeply for 4 seconds, hold for 7 seconds and breathe out for 8 seconds. Do this a few times to calm yourself down and allow yourself to refocus.

Top 10 Tips for Dealing with Test and Examination Pressure Continued...

5. BE PREPARED ON THE DAY

Make sure you have packed or prepared everything you need for the test the night before. Have a plan for how you are going to get to school on time - including a back-up plan if necessary. Eat a nutritious breakfast and make sure you are hydrated.

6. VISUALISE

Use visualisation techniques to help reduce your stress on the day. Every day in the weeks prior to the exam, last thing at night and first thing in the morning, visualise yourself calmly walking into the exam room, preparing your equipment, reviewing and completing your exam paper and feeling good about how you did.

7. INVOLVE YOUR PARENTS IN YOUR SCHOOLWORK

Throughout the term talk to your parents about what you are studying. Show them your bookwork and homework. The more your parents understand about what you are doing and how you are going along the way, the better they are able to manage their expectations. They may also be able to help you study by testing you on what you are learning.

8. TALK TO YOUR PARENTS ABOUT REALISTIC GOALS

Keep talking to your parents about what you want to achieve, in individual subjects, at school overall and in other aspects of your life. Focus more on the learning and developing skills instead of just marks. Involve them in helping you to identify where to concentrate the most effort to achieve your goals.

Top 10 Tips for Dealing with Test and Examination Pressure Continued...

9. UNDERSTAND EXPECTATIONS

Many students feel like they are not meeting their parents' expectations. Often this is a result of poor communication about expectations by both parties. Assessment and reporting systems also change over time and are different in different schools and systems. Making sure your parents really understand what your report means may help them to understand what you are actually achieving. Your school can assist you to explain these to your parents if need be and most schools provide booklets of explanation. Often students are achieving, but reporting structures may not clearly represent this to parents.

10. ASK FOR HELP

The most important way to deal with stress is by talking to people and asking for help. Don't try and go it alone. Your school, teachers, parents and friends are your support structure so keep lines of communication open (that means talk to them!) and let everyone know how you are feeling and what help you need.



Tiwi islands was a great learning experience for O'Loughlin Catholic College students. It gave the group and I great perspective's and we learnt things we can bring back into our lives. Tarntipi campsite was a great camping area as we were in the heart of Tiwi Island. We were a perfect distance from the beach and from the freshwater hole. The beach was filled with activities like fishing, footy, and spear making. I was fascinated by the art works on display and the way the Tiwi People live. I will love to go to Tiwi again as it was a great experience and I hope to visit there again soon. A think to improve the camp they could improve the facilities because it was annoying when I had a shower I would walk onto dirt. But this is Tiwi life so it makes me appreciate the things I have at home.

Firstly, thank you to the Tarntipi Staff and all the Tiwi mob that helped on our cultural camp (especially Teddy and Marmalade the elders and TO's of the area). Also thank you to all the OCC teachers and staff that attended. Our Year 10 students learnt so much during their 3-day experience. This was the first time we have ran a camp over to Tiwi Islands and we are looking forward to doing it again next year. Here are some of the student's recounts of their camp:






Tarntipi was a once in a lifetime experience to explore the Tiwi culture and what the Tiwi people do in their avery day life. It was a very special experience. We learnt about their different tribes, marriage rules and how they hunt. We learnt that girls and boys have very separate jobs that the other gender isn't allowed to participate in. For example the elder women taught us girls how to make paint, how to dot paint shells, and how they strip leaves ready to weave. Whereas the boys weren't allowed to participate in these activities, only watch. The boys went out to find sticks and turned them into spears and then painted those; and once again, the girls weren't allowed to join in. On the second evening we sat around the campfire and learnt some of there traditional dances and later we had the option to go possum hunting with the spears the boys made. Our group actually caught one possum, which no other group managed to do. Written by Sarah and Shakaila



On our year 10 camp to Tiwi Island, we stayed at Bathurst Island. Our trip there was by ferry (2.5 hrs), while our way back was only a 14-minute plane ride back. When we arrived, we were introduced to the Tiwi mob and got settled into our tents. Our first activity was a beach visit. Some people went fishing, while others just sat in the water, took in the views and relaxed. For dinner we had pasta and we had the opportunity to listen to dream time stories. The following days were spent learning about Tiwi culture, going to the beach and swimming in the freshwater hole that was close to camp. Our favorite part of the camp was going to the beach because it was beautiful. The hardest part of camp was the cold water showers and the drop toilets, but it waws all part of the experience.


YEAR 10 TIWI CAMP

We were in camp group 1 and it was exciting to head to Tiwi Islands for our school camp. We went on ferry on the way there and came back on a small plane. The people that were in our group were Les, Lucas , Korbyn, Dinudi, Anna, Innes, Ciara, and a few others. Things that we learnt included how to make spears and bush medicine. We also did a bush walk, swam in the fresh water holes, went possum hunting at night, danced, sung songs, looked for turtle eggs and went fishing. The camp highlight for us was singing and dancing with the traditional owners around the fire at night and spending time chatting to the Tiwi mob.



The highlight for the camp was definitely the possum hunting because it was quite exciting seeing the group hunt and do something they have never done before. I rate it a solid 9/10.0ther great experiences during the camp were:

- The boat ride over to Tiwi (8.5/10)
- Chilling at the beach (8/10)
- Tiwi Taxi (7.5/10)

My worst experience at the camp was probably getting stuck on the mud while I was searching for a stick for the spear making. I had to stay muddy all day until I got back to camp (0.5/10).



In week 5 of Term 3, the Stage 2 Outdoor Education Class embarked on the Lake Argyle Expedition that lasted 5 days and 4 nights. The class consisted of 10 students, with 3 supervisors, totalling at 13 people overall. We kayaked a total distance of 56km over the trip and the highlights were fishing for big Catfish, improvement to our kayaking, so much swimming, so much eating (especially Samson and Ari) and of course, socialising with our amazing group. As his trip was a self-reliance assessment, we were in charge of mostly everything on the camp. This included choosing the distances of travel, the equipment we packed and being in charge of navigation around the lake using compass bearings and maps. Our supervisors took a step back (although hesitatingly) from the spotlight and let us run the show, which we run at an (almost) perfect level if we do say so ourselves:) Please enjoy our recap....

At 6am on a Saturday morning, the class met at the College and prepared to embark on our journey. The drive down to Lake Argyle was tedious and lengthy, with most people relying heavily on sleep to get through, but the experiences ahead were highly anticipated. We had crossed the border of Western Australia and travelled 1 ½ hours back in time, and continued our drive to the Lake Argyle Resort. On our first night, we had set up tents in the Caravan Park and treated ourselves to dinner at the restaurant, whilst focusing entirely on the Matilda's game that evening.

The next day, we woke up at 5am AWST and prepared for our paddling adventure. We had waterproofed all our gear prior to the camp and when we arrived at the boat ramp we had to spend time packing it into our kayays. We were ready and on the water by 6.30am. We then paddled all the way to our first destination, Old Shady. It was long, arduous, and exhilarating; but our perseverance was what drove us to our destination. On the second day of the camp, we travelled 12km with a few breaks in between to break up the distance. We would spend our afternoon catching fish, setting up camp, and cooking fish over the fire (which Samson and Ari devoured almost every night). Who would have thought that catfish (or Silver Cobbler as the locals call it) would taste so good. It's actually a very sought after fish in other countries, which is why it is caught and exported from the Lake.

The third day of camp, we packed our camp up and embarked early in the morning to our second location, Hagan Island. Originally, due to the Outdoor Ed trip being entirely Self Reliant, we had the ability to run our camp the way we wanted to run it. Many of us agreed on the night before that the paddling during the day was hard, and considered going to a location much closer than the distance we were originally going to travel. We proceeded to a previous break point where we had to collect some lost goggles, then we decided collectively to travel the full distance to Hagan Island. It was a full on, 18km paddle all the way from one side of the lake to the other. Burning sensations in our shoulders, we gracefully arrived at our new campsite. It was a spectacular location, shielded on all sides by mountains, with the sun setting in the west on the backdrop of the surrounding mountainous region. We were all very proud of the long distances we were able to cover that day and felt accomplished that we stuck to the original plan. Our night consisted of more fishing, dinner under the stars and Hendo's funny light up stick figure (with glow sticks).

Our next day, we hit the water by 8am, a much later start than before, and we travelled to a camp site called Party Point. The paddling was extensive and rigorous, but we arrived at Party Point with a sigh of relief. But the work didn't stop there. Everyone had to pitch in and flatten out the camp to create tent pads. Some of the groups went above and beyond... even creating welcome mats at the front of their tent with rocks. That night we huddled around the bonfire and did our last ever ODE debrief and camp chat. So many great memories this year. A NSW surf camp, a kakadu hike and now a WA paddle tip under our belt.

Finally, on the final day we prepared for a super early departure and sunrise paddle. We were up at 4am, head torches on and paddling in the dark. This made navigation challenging but not impossible. It was incredible to be paddling as the sun rose in front of us. What a way to finish the trip.

Our overall camp experience was arduous, enjoyable, but underlyingly, worth it. It was a great finish to our class's final camp and our Outdoor Ed Journey. The photos do not do this incredible location justice. If you ever get a chance to visit Lake Argyle, we say DO IT!


