

RISK MANAGEMENT

Scope: This policy applies to all Catholic kindergartens, schools, colleges and services (including the Catholic Education Office) conducted by Catholic Education, Diocese of Rockhampton (referred to as CEDR in the document).

1. POLICY STATEMENT

Catholic Education in the Diocese of Rockhampton (CEDR) is committed to adopting a strategic, consistent and structured enterprise-wide approach to risk management in order to achieve an appropriate balance between realising opportunities for gains and minimising losses, and to ensure that the organisation is able to achieve its Charter.

Risk Management is an integral part of sound management practice and an essential element of good corporate governance and responsible stewardship, as it improves decision-making and enhances outcomes and accountability.

2. DESCRIPTION

The *ISO 31000:2018 Risk Management – Guidelines* defines risk management as "coordinated activities to direct and control an organisation with regard to risk".

Risk arises in all aspects of the CEDR operations and at all stages within the life cycle of those operations. Risk offers both opportunity and threat and must therefore be managed appropriately.

Risk management involves establishing an appropriate risk management infrastructure and culture and applying logical and systematic risk management processes to all stages in the life cycle of any activity, function or operation. By minimising losses and maximising gains, risk management enables CEDR to best meet its organisational and strategic objectives.

This policy confirms CEDR's commitment to adopting a strategic, consistent and structured enterprise-wide approach to risk management in order to achieve an appropriate balance between realising opportunities for gains and minimising losses, and to ensure that the organisation is able to achieve its Charter.

3. IMPLEMENTATION ISSUES

The application of the risk management framework will provide the basis for:

1. pro-active rather than re-active management
2. confident and rigorous decision-making and planning



3. the development of a more risk aware organisational culture through enhanced communication and reporting of risk
4. the identification of opportunities and threats
5. effective allocation and use of resources
6. incident management and reduction in loss and the cost of risk, including commercial insurance premiums
7. building stakeholder confidence and trust
8. a clear understanding by all staff of their roles, responsibilities and authorities for managing risk
9. compliance with relevant legislation.
