First Nations Team

Term Three started with a visit to the Holy Spirit Catholic Primary School. Seven of our Year 11 students (Amaya Pearce, Darylle Sam, Kesia Bob, Jorja Neucom, Georgia Clay and Matilda Neucom) spent the morning assisting in the schools NAIDOC celebrations by running a painting station, and helping the kids to paint wooden boomerangs, emu', kangaroos and hand prints. The girls also helped out at the Face Painting stations.

Our Year 9 students also spent some time at the St Joseph Catholic Primary School in Mundingburra. Charlotte Kirkpatrick, Tilly Westwood and Violet Ziehmer spent their lunch break reading stories written by First Nation Authors to the students. Two weeks later, Shaniqua Ahwang, Racyna Binawel and Florianna Sakail went to the school to teach the students a Torres Strait Islander dance during their lunchtime as well. These programs are part of the Emerging Leaders Cultural Engagement, but they also help to build some great partnerships with other Stakeholders.

Another important partnership has been with the Garbutt Magpies Association. This organisation runs an annual AFL competition which has a large number of our Primary Schools participate.









This event is designed to promote cultural awareness and increase youth participation in Australian Rules Football.

The day also recognises and coincides with the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Children's Day with this year's theme being "Little Footsteps, Big Future". We were very proud of our students; Ava Bowman, Tilly Westwood, Kesia Bob, Shaniqua Ahwang, Gemika Tapau, Racyna Binawel and Florianna Sakail, who all spent the day working as umpires for the games.

We have attended several program graduations this Term, including the QATSIF Graduation with four of our Year 12 students attending the ceremony at James Cook University in August. Congratulations to Ellie Thomson, Dakota Namok, Rylie Toby-O'Leary and Narzallia Doolah. Term Three also saw Calleigh Reynolds, Dakota Parker, Grace Brook and Addison Ironside graduate from the Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander Marine Science Program. Our team were all involved, with Zoe Brown taking the girls to the Gudjuda Ranger Day in Ayr, Mrs Louise Martin taking them to the Australian Institute of Marine Science, and Mr Willie Morganson going on the four day Orpheus Island Camp with them.

A shout out to Mrs Zoe Brown who received an award in recognition of her nomination in the 2025 Aunty Joan Hendriks Reconciliation Award and two of our students, Maria Namok and Kesia Bob, who received a Maggies Spirit Award at our Catholic Education Week Liturgy. We also congratulate Darylle Sam who has been successfully elected as one of our 2026 School Captains! Well Done Darylle!



Special Guest Jessica Murgha, owner of Aviemore Highland Dancers Townsville, shared her experience with the students. She challenged them to learn a number of traditional Highland dances, testing their endurance with each pas de bas. First Nations student Ellie Murgha was one of the students to lead the demonstrations and helped students reach new heights with their high cuts.

Mrs Stacey Seri shared her passion and knowledge of Irish dancing with the students as they leapt over brooms and danced hand in hand, learning a traditional Celtic dance and a brush dance.

Mr Koulakis finished the unit by sharing his love of Greek dancing, ensuring that students smile and embrace the joy of the different cultures.

This is one of the highlights for our students here at the College.














QATSIF Graduation








Garbutt Magpies AFL Cup

Ngurra Home is the final book in the series by Carl Merrison & Hakea Hustler. It follows the life of Mia, who is now in her final year of university studying Bachelor of Conservation and Wildlife. She works part-time at a veterinarian surgery and does voluntary work for the local animal sanctuary in Perth. Mia comes from Jara, which is a community in the East Kimberleys. She required strength and determination to go to the city to study but as she keeps telling herself it is for her 'community'.

When her grandfather falls ill she goes home [Ngurra] to him as 'family always comes first'. Here she reunites with her family and discovers a rift between her community and a proposed mining development site. It is then that she is reminded that 'If you don't push out of your comfort zone, you'll never fly' and the pull of family and the stakes of protecting country lead her into meaningful action.

This is an inspiring read for young readers and reminds them of the need for strength, identity and responsibility.
