A Message From Our Principal



Early Years (P&1) News

What a fortnight of fun and learning we've had in the Early Years classroom! From being authors to being actors, from shape spotting to digraph spotting - your little learners have been busy bees indeed!

Students have been diving into the Writing Process with curiosity and excitement, as they begin crafting information reports on an Australian animal of their choice. They've been swapping between their 'Author Hat' and 'Reader Hat,' as they work to improve sentence fluency and conventions (ask them what that means, you might be impressed). Our Prep students are becoming detectives in the world of digraphs such as sh, th, ch, while our Year Ones are zooming ahead with fluency and accuracy. Reader's Theatre was a highlight this week. Students acted out fun scenes using their digraphs and trigraphs, blending the world of reading with performance and there were giggles, drama and LOTS of expression! Let's just say... Hollywood, here we come!

We've had a blast in Maths this fortnight, as we explored the wonderful world of three dimensional shapes- spheres, cylinders, cubes, oh my! The students enjoyed noticing what made each shape unique, and how they could be sorted based on their faces, edges and vertices. To cap it off, they put their learning into shape by building their very own 3D models to explore the shapes further.

In Religion, we delved further into the Old Testament where students learned about the special covenant between God and Abraham. This fortnight students learned about how Jewish people also have a special relationship with God, and some of their special symbols and clothing - like the Tallit, a prayer shawl with Tzit Tzits (fringes).

Science took us on a journey this week! We visited the Waltzing Matilda Centre where students explored all things materials. Students touched, observed and discussed how some materials used in the past have changed. They were quick to point out why we don't use glass for tyres or wool for umbrellas (imagine that soggy mess). It was a great learning experience and a hands-on way to explore the world around us.

It has been a wonderful fortnight in Early Years, with continued growth, independence and imagination. I can't wait for you to see what is next for our little learners!

Middle Primary (2&3) News

Our Middle Primary students have been busy over the fortnight, making excellent progress across all learning areas, and we're proud of the curiosity, creativity and collaboration they bring to each day.

In English, students have shown strong growth in both reading and writing. Many have transitioned from decodable texts to more advanced books, allowing them to build accuracy, fluency and comprehension. We've been practising strategies to understand both literal and inferred meaning, and to respond thoughtfully to a range of texts.



Our writing sessions have been full of imagination and energy! Using The BFG as a mentor text, students have explored how authors use invented words to create vivid worlds and memorable characters. This has led to rich vocabulary building and playful experimentation with descriptive language. We've extended this creativity into poetry, where students have crafted their BFG-inspired pieces. Year 2 students focused on acrostic poems while Year 3 students explored couplets using rhyme, onomatopoeia and alliteration. These experiences have helped students understand how language choices shape meaning and bring writing to life.

In Mathematics, we've been investigating location and transformation. Year 2 students have been interpreting simple maps, following directions and using positional language such as "next to," "between," and "left/right." Year 3 students have extended this by using grid references, compass points and scaled maps to describe routes and locations. These activities help students understand spatial relationships and communicate directions clearly - skills that are both practical and fund

In Science, we've begun exploring how heat can change the state of materials - such as melting, freezing and evaporation through hands-on investigations that spark curiosity and scientific thinking.



Middle Primary (cont.)

In Religion, students are learning about the Trinity and how God the Father, Son and Holy Spirit are united in love and purpose. This learning invites reflection and helps students understand the sacred relationships at the heart of our faith.

In History, students have been exploring how life in communities has changed over time. A highlight was our visit to the Waltzing Matilda Centre where students examined artefacts, photographs and stories from both past and present. Year 2 students focused on identifying changes in daily life—such as transport, technology and celebrations. Year 3 students extended this by learning how people of diverse backgrounds have shaped the local community and how their contributions are recognised. This inquiry has deepened students' understanding of continuity, change and the rich character of our shared history.

Upper Primary (4/5/6) News

This term, our Upper Primary students have been weaving their own magic through learning - turning challenges into adventures and achievements into stories worth sharing. As it is Book Week, we've been celebrating literature while creating texts of our own in the classroom. You could say our students are fully *booked* with exciting learning adventures!

This term, students have stepped into the shoes of extraordinary people through their biography writing. After choosing their subject, they've researched, planned and are currently drafting their pieces while conferencing with Miss Stacey for feedback to inform their next steps. Next week, students will revise, edit and publish their biographies - following the writing process like seasoned authors. They've been working on polishing their topic sentences, paragraphs, sentence fluency and voice- turning their drafts into real pageturners! In Reading, our students have completed self-reflections to set personalised reading goals, and this fortnight they're bringing stories to life through Readers' Theatre. This activity provides students with a chance to read dramatically, collaboratively and show just how creative they can be.

In Maths, it's measurement madness! Students have been exploring capacity, length, temperature and mass through hands-on, practical activities. They've been learning how to make reasonable estimates, compare units, measure accurately and convert between units. Lessons have been filled with opportunities to investigate, test ideas and apply their skills in real-world contexts. From pouring liquids to weighing everyday objects and using thermometers, students are developing confidence and accuracy in their measurement skills while strengthening their problem-solving abilities.

In Religion, students have been exploring New Testament scripture. They've identified words, actions and symbols, then linked these to the Holy Trinity. Using both scripture and visual forms has led to rich classroom discussions. Our students are learning that scripture, much like literature, is filled with layers of meaning waiting to be discovered.

No need to shelf the Upper Primary's creativity, it's on full display!
