FROM THE PRINCIPAL...



Dear Members of the St John's Catholic College Community,

Welcome:

The College welcomes Ava (Year 9) and Bailee (Year 7) into our school community. In addition, St John's is supporting NT students Antonio (Westminster School SA) and Molly (Immanuel College SA) who have been delayed in returning to their southern boarding schools due to the COVID-19 situation. Antonio and Molly are accessing the support structures on offer at St John's to assist with continuity of learning. Please note that the College is still open to receive applications for enrolment for 2020 and 2021. Year 5 / 6 students at St Mary's Catholic Primary School, St Paul's Catholic Primary School and Holy Spirit Catholic Primary School will now have their 'Windows Days' take place during Term 3 in a roadshow format – more information will follow this term. In addition, this term we welcome

back Jay Sung and welcome Phoebe Chan who are undertaking their professional placement as part of their studies at Charles Darwin University (CDU) – we wish them well.

COVID-19:

Thank you to our students, staff, parents and guardians for your resilience, dedication and support as we work together during these challenging times. Three weeks into Term 2 and our College is to be affirmed in the way in which we are responding and adjusting to the 'new normal'. Where possible, the College is working hard to return to normal operations and routines with added protocols; however, our boarding operations continue to be the most impacted by the measures put in place. Due to the associated risks with operating a boarding house in the current COVID-19 environment and the restrictions enacted under the Commonwealth Biosecurity Act, the boarding house remains closed. However, the College is working with the Northern Territory Government, planning for the reopening of boarding under a plan that manages and reduces risk for students and staff. A key date for the College will be Thursday 18 June, which is the current expiry of the restrictions in remote communities enacted by the Commonwealth Biosecurity Act. The caveat is that this date is subject to a Commonwealth Government decision. Until boarding students can return to the College, students are expected to continue to access education from home and through community schools, accessing resources from St John's via mail out packs and / or the learning platform Edmodo. College staff continue to make regular contact with boarding students and their families to engage and support.

SACE Stage 1 and Stage 2 Subjects:

An additional resource has been added to the College website to inform prospective and current students of the SACE Stage 1 and Stage 2 subjects on offer at the College. The resource will support students and families in making an informed decision regarding pathways and study options available. Every student should be consulting this document as they plan their journey into and through senior school. Catholic Education Paediatric Clinic:

St John's is proud to announce that we have been selected as the base for the Catholic Education Northern Territory Paediatric Clinic. Catholic Education NT have developed a new model of care for students identified with learning, behavioural, or developmental difficulties across our network of schools. This new initiative aims to reduce the waiting time for paediatric appointments and to deliver a co-ordinated approach to gain a full understanding of students' strengths, weaknesses, and learning profile. The main focus will be on issues directly related to educational concerns. If you would like your son / daughter to attend this service, appointments can be made through Darwin Children's Clinic on 8901 7727. Please mention that you wish to be seen as part of the Catholic Education Paediatric Clinic (CEPC) at the time of booking. Some key points:

- CPEC will be based at St John's but managed through the Darwin Children's Clinic consulting fees apply.
- CPEC is a support service available to all CENT students, not just students of St John's Catholic College.
- A referral from a GP is required to attend the CPEC with the focus on issues directly related to educational concerns.
- Further information can be obtained through Inclusion Support Services at the Catholic Education

60 Year Celebrations:


I would also like to thank our support staff and boarding parents for providing support for students during this time.



is not easy for both teachers and students, but it is very important to keep the structure and continuity of education until the boarding house can reopen again.



Supporting Territory Families: 2019-20 Urban Sport Vouchers Extended

6 May 2020

The Urban Sport Voucher Scheme helps families with the cost of organised sport, recreation and cultural activities and due to COVID-19 restrictions, the Territory Labor Government is extending the redemption date for the 2019-20 Sport and Learn to Swim Vouchers to 12 June 2020.

The vouchers are available to every child enrolled in school from preschool to year 12, including home-schooled children.

Families with children enrolled in urban schools are entitled to a \$100 sport voucher each semester to help with the cost of their child participating in a chosen sport, active recreation or cultural activity.

For those parents or carers yet to request a 2019-20 voucher, you can still do so up until 31 May 2020, noting that the voucher needs to be redeemed by the new date of 12 June 2020.

Information for Parents and Carers

- If you haven't done so already, you can request your 2019-20 Financial Year Sport and Learn to Swim Vouchers by 31 May 2020 at http://www.sportvoucher.nt.gov.au/apply. (This includes the 2019 semester two voucher and the latest 2020 semester one voucher).
- All 2019-20 Financial Year Sport and Learn to Swim Vouchers normally need to be requested by 24
 May and redeemed by 31 May each year, however due to COVID-19 restrictions the requesting
 date has been extended to 31 May 2020 and the redemption date for Activity Providers is
 extended to 12 June 2020.

Information for Providers

- Redeem your 2019-20 Financial Year Sport and Learn to Swim Vouchers by 12 June 2020.
- All 2019-20 Financial Year Sport and Learn to Swim Vouchers are normally redeemed by 31 May each year. Due to the COVID-19 restrictions, the 2019-20 redemption date is extended to 12 June 2020, as a measure to support your organisation.
