It is important that all students who are eligible for an ATAR ensure that their 'Sharing Preferences' are ticked in StudentsOnline in order for their results to be shared with SATAC and the College. If students do not share their results with SATAC then an ATAR will not be generated. All Year 12 students have logged into StudentsOnline this week to check this.

Year 12 Result Release Day:

Results will be released on Tuesday 15 December at 8:30am. Students are reminded to log into StudentsOnline prior to this to ensure they can access their results. If students have

SATAC First Round Offers:

SATAC's first round offers will be on the 20th December. Please see the information below from SATAC (https:// www.satac.edu.au/frequently-asked-questions-december-20-offer-round)

This year SATAC will again make offers on 20 December, shortly after SACE and NTCET students receive their year 12 results. But how does the offer round work, and what can you expect? Last year more than 7500 prospective students received an offer in the late December offer round, and this year we expect that number to be even more. If you're a current Year 12 student you will likely be focused on your upcoming exams, but you might also be wondering, what happens next? We've put together some frequently asked questions about the 20 December offer round to help demystify the process.

Is the December 20 offer round different to other offer rounds?

Yes, the December 20 offer round is the first offer round for the 2020 admission year that considers all preferences and most courses will make offers in this round. It's also the first offer round following the release of SACE/NTCET results.

There are some strict quota courses that may not make offers in December, with most or all offers made in January. These are:

- Bachelor of Clinical Science/Doctor of Medicine at Flinders University
- Bachelor of Medical Radiation Science (Medical Imaging) at University of South Australia Bachelor of Medical Radiation Science (Nuclear Medicine) at University of South Australia
- Bachelor of Medical Radiation Science (Radiation Therapy) at University of South Australia

Some other strict quota courses may also only make limited offers in December.

The Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) is a rank given to students on a range from 0 to 99.95.

SATAC calculates the ATAR for SACE and NTCET students.

What is the ATAR used for:

Tertiary institutions use the ATAR to select students for their courses.

Course selection can be competitive. This happens when courses have more applicants than places available to offer. For this reason, the institutions need a way of ranking applicants for each course.

The ATAR is a fair and transparent tool for comparing the results of students who are applying for the same

course but have likely studied different subjects at school.

The ATAR shows how you performed in your studies compared to other students in your age group.

How to get an ATAR (SACE/NTCET students:

To qualify for an ATAR you need a university aggregate. SATAC calculates the university aggregate by combining the scaled scores from your best 90 credits of study.

To be eligible for a university aggregate you will need to:

- Qualify for the SACE/NTCET
- Follow the rules for precluded combinations
- Follow the rules for counting restrictions
- Complete at least 90 credits of study in Tertiary Admissions Subjects (TAS) and Recognised Studies at Stage 2 in no more than three attempts which need not be in consecutive years
- of the 90 credits of study at least 60 credits of study must be from 20 credit TAS*
- * 10 credit subjects usually don't count towards this rule but some 10 credit subjects in the same learning area, when studied in pairs, can substitute for a 20 credit subject. These are valid pairs.

How SATAC calculates the ATAR:

To calculate an ATAR from your university aggregate, we need to look at the percentage of students who achieved the same aggregate as you, or better. This allows SATAC to assign a percentile rank (between 0 and 100) for each university aggregate achieved. For example:

- You get an aggregate of 78.00 out of 90.00 10% of students also get 78.00 out of 90.00 or better The aggregate of 78.00 now corresponds to rank of 90.00 (100 minus 10)

We do this every year for SACE and NTCET students who qualify for a university aggregate. The group of students who qualify for an aggregate in 2020 is the 2020 cohort.

The next step is looking where the 2020 cohort sits compared to the entire population of students across Australia who are in the same age group. The 2020 cohort may differ from other years in that it may represent a smaller or larger percentage of the population who are in the same age group. The percentage from the given year is the participation rate. We calculate the participation rate using population statistics from the Australian Bureau of Statistics and measuring these against the size of the cohort. SATAC adjusts the percentile rank to take account of the participation rate and where you sit relative to the entire population. The result is the ATAR. So, if you achieve an ATAR of 95.00 it shows that you performed as well as, or better than, 95% of the population.

Note:

It is important to remember that the ATAR is a rank, not a score. It compares overall performance across the group, rather than individual performance in specific subjects. Its main use is to select students for tertiary courses.

What'll Happen to the Wattle??!

SYDNEY --One <u>Giant Leap Australia Foundation</u> is sending native golden wattle seeds to the International Space Station in early December, 2020.

In collaboration with the Japan Aerospace Exploration Agency (JAXA) the seeds will live in space for six months, returning to Australia in time for Science Week 2021.

Supported by the Australian Space Agency, the "What'll happen with the wattle??!" programme is being offered to more than 150 schools, scout groups and Australian Air Force Cadets across Australia.

A community panel judged the applications that included 200 words and a short video, explaining what the schools would do with the wattle once it had grown.

One of the panel members said, "We have spent 5 days watching videos. Entries from all over Australia. From a single teacher in a face mask in a school in Victoria to a small school in remote Northern Territory. It has been an amazing opportunity to laugh and cry our way through them."

"Our school, St John's Catholic College has been identified as one of the 150 schools that will participate in the Giant Leap Australia Foundation. Our 7/8 Science class will plant the seeds and collect the data."



Once selected, the chosen schools around Australia will receive wattle seeds that have flown to space, plus seeds that have not. The seeds are from the same seed lot. Students are asked to

germinate and grow their seeds, recording data about the germination and seed growth. Data will be uploaded to the 'What'll happen to the wattle??!' app.

Throughout the programme, One Giant Leap Australia Foundation will run teleconferences and provide educational support to participating groups.

The 12-month to 2 year project will result in the creation of a nationwide map identifying the location of Australia's 'space wattle' trees.

The project is an historic opportunity for Australian schools and students.




