Dear Members of the St John's Catholic College Community.

The Feast of the Sacred Heart of Jesus was celebrated on Friday 11 June. At St John's, this is one of the most significant and memorable days on the College Calendar. As a College immersed in the charism of the Missionaries of the Sacred Heart (MSC) and the Daughters of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart (OLSH), the Feast of the Sacred Heart is our Feast Day - Sacred Heart Day.

It is a day where we celebrate being 'Heart People', a community committed to leading, living, loving and learning with a strong sense of Heart Spirituality. We thank Father Malcolm Fyfe, Vicar General of the Diocese of Darwin and a Missionary of the Sacred Heart, for celebrating Mass with us at St Mary's Cathedral. FROM THE ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL: TEACHING AND LEARNING



Dear Members of the St John's Catholic College Community,

Restructure of the Academic Care Team - Trial

As part of streamlining our processes in teaching and learning, the College will trial an alternative structure to the Academic Care Team from the beginning of Semester 2 2021. The trial period will be 18 months with a review to be conducted towards the end of the period.

A consultation process has occurred during Term 2 with the SLT, ACT and all teaching staff. It is hoped the alternative structure will provide the ability to focus more on 21st century pedagogy and greater engagement for students in the classroom.

The team is led by the AP T&L and currently consists of:

- APRE
- Head of STEM
- Head of Humanities
- Head of HPE/Arts
- VET/Careers Coordinator
- Inclusion Support Coordinator

The alternative structure would see the Heads of Faculty replaced by an ACARA Coordinator and a SACE Coordinator. The team would continue to be led by the AP T&L and consist of:



The Northern Territory Certificate of Education and Training (NTCET)

It is timely to remind Stage 1 and Stage 2 students of the requirements of the NTCET. It is important that students understand what the compulsory subjects are, how many credits they must achieve and the grades they must earn to achieve the NTCET. Below is a summary for each year level undertaking the NTCET. Students who do not meet the markers listed below will receive an 'at risk' letter from the College.

By the end of Year 10


- A minimum of 40 credits at Stage 1 with a 'C' grade or higher
- Successful completion of Stage 1 Personal Learning Plan
- Successful completion of one Stage 1 Literacy unit

By the end of Year 11

- Achieve 140 credits at a 'C' grade or higher
- Successful completion of two Stage 1 Literacy units
- Successful completion of one Stage 1 Numeracy unit

By the end of Year 12

- Achieve a C- or better in 60 credits at Stage 2
- ATAR aspirants must achieve 90 credits at Stage 2
- Successful completion of 200 credits



Stage 2 Student Tracking

As part of the student tracking process at Stage 2, students received a 'traffic light' summary of their current progress in the studies. Green indicates the student is progressing, yellow means the student is currently of concern (may be assessment tasks outstanding) and red means the students is at risk of failing the subject.

Progress Key	On Track	Of Concern	At Risk of Failure

Those students who did not receive their tracking are asked to see Mrs Hughes.

Any students who are at risk of not achieving the NTCET will receive an 'at risk' letter with their reports.

Our Stage 2 teachers have been working hard with students to ensure they reach their potential in their subjects. Students are reminded to communicate regularly with their teachers and follow feedback provided by their teachers.

Semester Reports

Semester reports will be released at the beginning of the June/July holidays. If you have changed address or mailing address please advise the administration team prior to reports being released.

Semester reports will include an overall grade for each subject studied for Years 7-11. Stage 2 subjects will not have an overall grade due to moderation processes which take place in the latter part of Term 3 and early Term 4. Grades which appear in reports for Stage 2 are subject to change due to moderation. While some grades for assessment tasks will appear for Stage 2, please note that external assessment tasks will not have a grade allocated. External tasks are marked and final grade allocated by the SACE Board.

Please also note that assessment tasks that have yet to be completed will have an 'N' allocated.

Stage 1 subjects should have an overall grade, however, due to printing timelines, some Stage 1 subjects will have an 'N'. Students will receive a statement from the NT Government with their semester results and overall grade for all Stage 1 subject studied this semester.

Your son/daughter's timetable, important notices, letters etc will also be included with reports.

As all classes are up and running, all students should have access to their Edmodo groups for each subject. Edmodo allows our students to have access to class materials out of class and to submit their assessment tasks online. Feedback and grades for assessment tasks are available online for students when complete. Parents are able to be provided with a unique code for their child in order to access results and feedback as well. 

FROM THE ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL: RELIGIOUS EDUCATION



Dear Members of the St John's Catholic College Community,

There are in excess of one thousand references to the word 'heart' in the Bible rarely however, does the reference relate to the physical human organ. For the most part 'heart' is used in a symbolic, metaphorical way. In most of these references to 'heart' it refers to the whole person, the very essence, the real or true self. Many of us will be familiar with images of the Sacred Heart of Christ shown on the outside of his body, identifying Christ a not only human but a person who wears his heart, his show of love on the outside for all to see.

Pope Francis, in his 2013 homily on the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, said, "It is more difficult to let God love us than to love Him! The best way to love Him in return is to open our hearts and let Him love us." Every time we see these statues and icons we are reminded to open ourselves to the love of Christ and give ourselves completely to him as he does. He lays his heart open before us as an example of how to live our lives.

During our Sacred Heart Day Mass Fr Malcom Fyfe asked us to wear our hearts on the outside of our bodies just like Christ. When he said this though, I thought to myself that St John's students already wear our hearts on the outside, we just need to remind ourselves to make it more obvious sometimes.

Since our last newsletter we have exhibited how we wear our hearts on the outside through, recognising Refugee Week. This year Aisha Solomo and Said Nditije shared their stories of their early lives and how they and their families came to live in Australia and attend St John's College. It is a tough story to tell ad even tougher to listen to, however they both very bravely told a story that needed to be heard. The student body listened with open hearts and at the end gave them both a rousing applause at its conclusion.

During the feast day celebrations at Leanyer Water park I witnessed the sharing of friendship, the sharing of food and an immense sharing of who we are as members of a Sacred Heart School. Throughout that day we connected on a much deeper level to who we are and why we are here wearing our hearts on the outside throughout the entire day.

Subject Selection

Students completed their subject selections in Week 8 of Term 2. Semester 2 timetables will be sent home with reports. Any changes requested by Middle school students to elective subjects will be made only in first two weeks of the term. No changes will be made after week 2 Friday 30 July. Senior school students' elective changes will only occur if approved by Assistant Principal Teaching and Learning, Mrs Cherilyn Hughes after NTCET pattern check.



The Learning Lest operates Monday to Friday from 3:30pm - 5:00pm. Parents / Guardians are required to collect their children by 5:00pm. The purpose of the Learning Nest is to provide students with access to Tutors to support academic success. Tutors will assist students with homework, study, assessment items, proofreading and exam preparation. The Tutors are not responsible for the completion of student work. Therefore, students should attend the Learning Nest and approach Tutors for support at the earliest possible opportunity.

The Learning Nest is staffed by St John's Alumni currently studying at Charles Darwin University. The Learning Nestaims to cultivate an academic environment, whereby all students feel welcome and safe to access additional help to support their learning. Therefore, students attending the Learning Nestare expected to contribute to cultivating an academic environment.

By attending the Learning Nest, students agree to:

- Sign in on arrival and sign out on departure (students to inform a Tutor when they are departing the Learning Nest).
- Remain in the designated area (LOTE Centre) whilst attending the Learning Nest and inform a Tutor should they need to leave the designated area at any time.
- Respect the role and responsibilities of the Tutors, including following the reasonable instructions of Tutors.
- Be responsible for their learning and academic work. The Tutors are provided to support students with their work and are not responsible for the completion of students' assessment items.
- Contribute to the Learning Nest being a place of learning fostering an academic environment.
- Adhere to the College's electronic device policy (phones, iPads, etc) whereby devices are on silent, and remain in school bags and usage is at the discretion of the Tutor.

Please note, the College does not provide outside of school hours care. Students attending the Learning Nest are expected to be in the LOTE Centre under the supervision of the Tutors. Students who remain on campus to use the Oval and Jubilee Hall facilities after hours are not under staff supervision.
