

FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents

What a pleasure it is to welcome you all back to a relatively "normal" start to our Term 3. It is wonderful to be able to look at the term ahead and see it is genuinely busy, with a raft of curricular and co-curricular activities..

It is most evident from the reports written at the end of last semester that the vast majority of our students are committed to all aspects of the School program. By now, you would have read your children's report thoroughly and commenced the process of reorganising their goals for this semester. For most students there is always room for improvement and at the first assembly of the term I advocated for them to take heed of the comments their teachers have made on their reports. It is essential that students grasp the academic opportunities they have and work towards reaching their academic potential. To improve performance might mean better organisation of time and thinking about priorities; it might be planning ahead. It could be writing in more detail, preparing notes or even ensuring all homework is completed each evening. If students do need any tips or advice on improving their performance in class there are many helpful experts they can speak to around the school – all are most willing to give any assistance necessary.

Boarding Connections Tour

During the first week of the recent holidays, the Head of Boarding and I undertook a tour to visit our boarding families and meet a number of prospective students and their parents. Once restrictions allowed us, we were very keen to see as many boarding families as possible. Over six days, we visited Tully, Georgetown, Normanton, Karumba, Cloncurry, Julia Creek, Richmond, Winton and Hughenden. I wish to thank all of our families who took the time to meet with us, making us feel extremely welcome in this very special part of Queensland.

Introduction of House System - North Ward

As part of the School's ongoing endeavour to provide the best possible pastoral care for our students, a review of the current secondary school Pastoral Care Structure has led to a decision to change the current structure. From the commencement of 2021, the Pastoral Care delivery structure on the North Ward campus will change from a Year Level structure to one based on the existing House system. The dual primary drivers behind this restructure are: to enhance pastoral care for our students, and to strengthen School spirit. The School's desire is for an extended House system which is the very heart of our pastoral care, and more importantly, a system which provides the care and counselling for our students. The School also aims to introduce a more comprehensive and exciting structure of House competition, which goes beyond the present model.

House systems are effectively used by independent schools worldwide to deliver pastoral care with just some of the advantages of this structure as follows:

- A greater sense of spirit and community connection to peers and school, particularly across year levels.
- Improved leadership and mentoring opportunities for students within Houses.
- The inclusion and encouragement of participation and achievement in a variety of activities that include academic, sport, performing arts and other co-curricular activities. This will lead to a far stronger and more meaningful House competition.
- Promotion of student voice, entrepreneurship, responsibility, teamwork, leadership skills and co-operation.
- The opportunity to develop an awards/colours system allowing further recognition of commitment and excellence via the House structure.
- A more personal link for Alumni to connect to their old school.

Rollout

From the beginning of 2021, the platform for pastoral care will change from Year Level to House based. The School will retain the four traditional Houses – Hodges, Miller, Rowland, Whight – and these will provide the structure for a vertical pastoral care system.

Staffing

- The Year 7 and Year 12 Year Level Co-ordinators will be retained.
- Year 7 teachers will be retained as classroom teachers and pastoral carers.
- Four Heads of House to be appointed.
- Four Assistant Heads of House to be appointed.
- Form teachers' role remains the same; form class will include students from Year 8 12.

Semester 2 Planning

During Semester 2, further planning will include:

- The nature and delivery of pastoral care program during Form periods
- Student leadership via House structure
- The organisation and implementation of an enhanced House Competition
- Student mentoring and support opportunities
- The re-introduction of a House colours system
- House events and community support opportunities

Legacy

Each year, I speak to our Year 12 students about their legacy as the senior leaders of the School. Whilst we all acknowledge that the School is in a good place, through our leadership we strive to make it better – somewhat like the School's motto. At a recent Assembly, Vice-Captains of the School, Macey Bennett and Lachlan Vowell, spoke about legacy, unity and community. I have included their speech below.

Leaving a legacy. For senior students, it is a phrase that seems to echo and ring through our minds. Leaving a legacy. But what does leaving a legacy really mean?

To leave a legacy is to put a stamp on the future and create a contribution for future generations. To create a painting that has already been painted by Past Grammarians and continue to create a beautiful piece of artwork by adding our own, unique strokes. As Seniors, our goal this year is to create and build the legacy of those who have been here before us, for the benefit of those who will come here after us

Over the past two years we have had different themes to bring our School together and develop our School spirit. We have had "Grammar Grit", "All In" and our theme and hashtag for this year is Unite. The word delineates simplicity, yet we believe that the meaning is very relevant to our lives, especially this year. We believe that, more than ever, this year has been an opportunity where we have been able to unite and come together as a Grammar community. Even though throughout this year we may not have been united physically, we have been united through our School spirit.

To unite, is the idea that we as a school are one, that we are bonded together by the black and gold, which permeates everything that we do. It begins in the classroom, at the bag racks, in the Middle School, in the Quad, and in the small insignificant conversations we use to support each other. Because if we are a community that builds each other up when no one is watching, we will be a force to be reckoned with when all eyes are on us in future years.

But to unite means that we need every single person to commit to our School, to our community and to our spirit. We cannot have such a strong theme if our community does not show the strength in itself. To build our School spirit we need everyone, not just half of us and half our energy. We are Townsville Grammar School, and by bonding together and uniting, we will continue to live up to our name.

Involvement, commitment, and pride is the perfect formula to bring us all together.

Involvement: our school promotes every opportunity, so embrace it. There are so many opportunities at Grammar to show your spirit whether it is on the sports field, on the stage or in the classroom.

Commitment: you should always be all in. If you are going to do something, do it right and do it properly with as much enthusiasm as possible.

Pride: this is possibly the most important word because this is what creates the spirit. We need to be proud that we come from this school and we need to be proud that we are a part of such a strong community.

All of these elements are what creates our culture at TGS so that we are one big family, together as one. So do your part, take the next opportunity that comes your way so that we are able to unite.

Our Year 12 student leaders have led the School exceptionally well, under very challenging circumstances this year. They have been positive role models for the younger grades, provided service to others and will leave a strong legacy.

FROM THE DIRECTOR OF STUDIES

Subject Selection

Term 3 is the start of the subject selection process for 2021 in a number of year levels. If your child is currently in one of the following Year levels you will be receiving information about these choices and the process for recording these preferences later this term.

- Year 7 students will be given the opportunity to select their Modern Language choice for Year 8, French or Japanese.
- Year 8 students will choose four elective subjects for their Year 9 studies in addition to English, Mathematics, Science, History and Health & Physical Education.
- Year 9 students will choose three elective subjects for their Year 10 studies in addition to Mathematics, English and Science (Physical and/or Natural).
- Year 10 students will start their Senior Schooling journey with two different course options offered. They may choose the QCAA program by selecting four subjects in addition to both Mathematics and English or the International Baccalaureate (IB) program by selecting six subjects, one from each academic group.

On Thursday, 27 August TGS will host our Year 10 and 11 Subject Selection evening for all current Year 9 and 10 students and their parents. Teaching staff will be available to answer questions that you may have regarding the various subject and course offerings at TGS.

Year 12 Assessment

Year 12 students are currently completing their final internal assessment pieces for some subjects and will shortly complete the remaining content for their external examinations. There will be Mock external exams from 8 September through until 16 September for all QCAA General subjects. These exams will follow similar formats and time constraints as the external assessment pieces in October and will be an excellent indicator of student progression in their subjects. There will still be time after these have been completed for students to review their study practices and put in place their final study plans. Teachers will also be preparing students for these final exams during the first three weeks of Term 4. A reminder that students will only be required to attend school when their Mock exams are scheduled.

We will also be conducting School tours at 12:15pm on that day for those wishing to see the School grounds.



New Instrumental/Vocal Music Students

If your child would like to commence instrumental or singing lessons in Semester 2, tuition enrolment forms are available from the School website and the Music Centre. Students enrolled in Semester 1 have been automatically re-enrolled for Semester 2.

As enrolments are for a full semester (two terms), there is no refund of Music tuition fees for withdrawal once the lessons have commenced.

Notification of Absence from Instrumental/Singing Lessons

I respectfully remind families that we aim to accommodate planned absence from scheduled instrumental and singing lessons as much as we can. However, when lessons are missed without sufficient notification to the music tutor, or in some unfortunate cases, with no notice at all, then that lesson is not rescheduled, and is forfeited.

Students should advise their music tutor about in-class assessments and exams one or two weeks prior to the lesson, so that another lesson time can be scheduled. In the event of sudden illness or misadventure, the tutor should be informed as a matter of courtesy, but if the tutor is not notified with 24 hours' advance notice of an absence, then the lesson will not be made-up.

This policy is clearly stated on the enrolment contract which parents sign, and is duplicated in the School Handbook.

I am grateful indeed for the co-operation of families in the operation of the Music program.

FROM THE CO-ORDINATOR OF STUDENT WELLBEING AND DEVELOPMENT

As I sit here, with half an eye to posterity; as is my wont as an historian and History teacher, I am cognisant of our collective human need to process the times through which we are living. However, somewhat differently to our predecessors who 'survived' the 1918-1919 'Spanish Flu', I believe we can learn much about ourselves and, in some ways, use the challenges we face to grow our Character Strengths and resilience.

Right now, Victoria is facing circumstances which could be considered overwhelming. Each day, as I watch the Victorian Premier, Daniel Andrews, and the Chief Health Officer, Brett Sutton, present their media briefing, I see two men who are harnessing their Strengths of Love, Bravery and Hope; amongst others, to inspire those same qualities in their fellow Victorians and to help their state not just survive but defeat this crisis. Outside of Victoria, aside from feeling lucky, much of Australia is holding its breath, hoping that we can be spared what is happening there.

How does Victoria keep going and how can we, if we need to, rebound back required? The answer is in how we respond, personally, to the challenges COVID-19 presents and in how resilient we are or can become.

Positive Education, with its focus on Character Strengths/universal values, at its core, is about empowering our students with knowledge about their personal strengths to create their unique tool kits to deal with the challenges life presents and, in short, to flourish/bounce back in spite of them. That being said, sometimes the Strengths that we need for a given situation might not necessarily be in our top Strengths and might not naturally be in our arsenal to respond and get ourselves back 'on top'. Do not despair if this is you, or your child! Regardless of whether a Character Strength is a Signature Strength or a lesser strength, its power can be harnessed by practising it and either growing it or implementing it. Sometimes it just takes deliberate application to build our Strengths and resilience!

So, what are the Essential 2020 Strengths: Love, Bravery and Hope, and how do we grow them in ourselves, if they are not our natural 'go tos' under duress?

Love



What is 'Love' as a Character Strength? Valuing close relations with others, in particular those with whom sharing and caring are reciprocated; being close to people. There are four types of love, each with a biological and evolutionary base - Attachment e.g. parent for child; child for parent; Compassionate or altruistic

love e.g. kindness; Companionate e.g. friendship and Romantic e.g. spouse/partner/boyfriend/qirlfriend.

Compassionate love is what 2020 needs us to find and express. We need to find a way to think of others, as well as, or before, ourselves.

If Love is your signature strength you value close relations with others, in particular those with whom sharing and caring are reciprocated.

If Love is not in your top strengths, you can boost it! Try one or more of the following:

- Convey love at work by making an effort to understand who you are working with, finding out what is important to your colleague/s and engaging with them on the topic regularly.
- Offer the gift of listening. Focus on others and hear what they're really saying. Remember the 80/20 rule: Listen more, talk less.
- Say please and thank you. This is a simple act you can practise every day, but many of us often forget to do so.
- Actually voice and tell loved ones how much you love and appreciate them. Don't just assume they 'know'.
- Offer help to someone in need.
- Write a letter or card to someone you love and mail it.
- Engage in a favourite activity with a loved one (e.g. hiking, going to the park to play, biking, walking in the park, swimming, camping, jogging).

Bravery



'Bravery' is not shrinking from threat, challenge, difficulty, or pain; speaking up for what is right even if there is opposition; acting on convictions even if unpopular; it includes physical bravery but is not limited to it. There are three types of bravery: Physical bravery e.g. fire-fighters, police officers, soldiers; Psychological bravery e.g. facing painful aspects of oneself and Moral bravery e.g. speaking up for what is right, even if it is an unfavourable opinion to a group.

If Bravery is your signature strength, you are a courageous person who does not shrink from threat, challenge, difficulty, or pain. You speak up for what is right even if there is opposition. You act on your convictions.

If 'Bravery' is not something you have embraced before, you can grow it by:

- Identifying an area in which you generally shy away from confrontations. Practising the phrases, the tones, and the mannerisms that will enable you to effectively confront the situation next time
- Not being afraid to befriend someone who is different
- Sharing your honest thoughts, feelings, opinions
- Risking being wrong

- Trying something for the first time
- Being ok with making a mistake
- Saying "I don't know"
- Being in a photo
- Standing up for someone else/ yourself
- Wearing something outrageous
- Being the person to reach out after a conflict/argument

Hope



'Hope' is something we all think we know and have. Hope allows us to be positive when others might not be. It is expecting the best in the future and that this best can and will be brought about. It is being optimistic and believing you and your actions can and do influence outcomes

If 'hope' is something you need to find/develop, you could:

- Write/journal about a good event and why it will last and spread. Explicitly link this event to your actions
- Play with a baby. Babies are the epitome of hope!
- Plant something to grow. It's an investment in the future. Its maintenance and growth will develop and grow your hope.
- Volunteer and help others. Helping others is another investment in the future: the world can be made better.

2020 and COVID-19 present us with some 'unprecedented' and existential questions. Within each and every one of us, we have the strengths we need to answer them; it's just our recognition and the power of our strengths which differ. Love, Bravery and Hope are keys to building our resilience and ability to manage these times. We might not always have these strengths in the measures in which we need them, but we can build them by practising them in a variety of scenarios.

MATHEMATICS

Mathematics Challenge and Australian Mathematics Competition

We have had fifteen students from Years 7 to 10 complete the Mathematics Challenge for Young Australians, a problem solving competition for elite mathematicians. The results were pleasing with four Distinctions and three Credit certificates awarded. Our Distinction winners were: Arjun Nigam, Abdullah Al Itmam (7/2020), Timothy Rono (8/2020) and Sabeer Nayyar (9/2020).

In addition, we have the Australian Mathematics Competition coming up on Tuesday, 4 August. With short time lines, nominations had to be closed at the end of last term. I have a very small number of extra places available for students who would still like to participate but missed the payment due date. If you would like your child to secure a place please have them see me in the Mathematics staffroom as soon as possible (competition cost is \$6.50).

Mathematics Subject Choices in 2021

With Year 10 students starting the subject selection process for 2021 it is timely that they consider their options. If there are any questions relating to which mathematics subject they should be studying, I would encourage students and parents to contact the classroom teacher as first point of call.

Some points to note:

Year 10 General Mathematics students are only able to choose General Mathematics or Essential Mathematics in 2021. Students who have achieved "HA" or above in Year 10 Mathematical Methods SL or HL are prepared for Year 11 Mathematical Methods. Students who wish to do either Year 11 Specialist Mathematics or IB Mathematics would be expected to be "HA" or better in Year 10 Mathematical Methods HL. Please note that to study Year 11 Specialist Mathematics students must also be enrolled in Year 11 Mathematical Methods.

FROM THE CAREERS ADVISOR

Term 3 signifies an important step in the career development of students across Years 9 to 12 as they explore, plan and decide about career choices and future education, training and employment pathways.

Tertiary Education

This term is a very important time in the lives of our Year 12 students as they begin to make decisions about their post-schooling pathways.

QTAC Guide

At the end of Term 2, Year 12 students received their 2021 QTAC Guide which contains a list of all the university courses in Queensland. The QTAC Guide is designed to help students decide on their university course preferences.

QTAC Applications

Applications open on 4 August 2020. Students will need to register for a QTAC account in order to apply to university. Students will need to register using a personal email account instead of their School email as it will no longer exist on completion of Year 12. Students will require their LUI number when applying; this can be found on the student's individual QTAC Guide or in TASS. If students are applying for interstate university courses, then they will need to register with each Tertiary Admission Centre.

QTAC Student Presentation

A QTAC presentation for students will be held in Week 4 on Thursday, 6 August 2020. During this presentation, I will explain to students how to register and apply for university courses and list their preferences. Students should be using the QTAC Guide to check for specific course entry requirements and prerequisites.

QTAC Interviews

Commencing from Week 5 of Term 3, Year 12 students will have the opportunity to meet with me in small groups to discuss their preferences, application and any questions that they may have regarding tertiary admission. An appointment schedule will be distributed to students shortly.

JCU Medicine, Dentistry, Veterinary Applications

Domestic applications for medicine, dentistry and veterinary science will open on 4 August 2020. Application Forms are now available on the <u>JCU website</u>. Students interested in these courses will need to apply through QTAC and submit an Application Form to JCU. If you require a letter of support from the School or Prediction of Academic Achievement, please contact the Director of Studies, Dr Carolyn Moores.

University Course Guides

The links to the Course Guides for every university in Australia are available on the Townsville Grammar School careers website. Go to the "Post School Options" menu >> "University" >> "Info. About Uni's and Courses". The "Course Guide" link has been added to the list for each university.

Year 10 and 11 (2021) Subject Selection Evening

The Subject Selection Evening is being held in Week 7 on Thursday, 27 August 2020 from 6:00 – 7:00pm. We have also organised for various external education and training providers to be in attendance on the night.

Year 10 Subject Selection & Set Plan

Term 3 marks an important milestone in the career development of our Year 10 students as they make important decisions about their senior study pathway and consider their future education, training and employment goals. To assist students in this process, a series of events and workshops will take place throughout the term, including QCE & ATAR Presentation, Subject Selection Talks from our Heads of Faculty, special quests including JCU, QCU, TAFE and Defence, the Subject Selection Evening, SET plan interviews and the development of a Career Action Plan during CPD lesson time.

Career Action Plan

The development of a Career Action Plan during Term 3 aims to help Year 10 students with exploring the skills, training and education requirements relating to their career choices, and using their decision-making skills to plan for their senior learning program and future career pathways. A student's individualised Career Action Plan includes their SET Plan. It is expected that students are engaging in conversations and discussions with their parents and caregivers regarding the development of their Career Action Plan.

SET Plan Interviews

Small group interviews are underway with students to discuss their SET plan, which includes discussing their subject choices for next year, as well as possible pathways in education, training and employment.

LUI and MyQCE

Students in Year 10 will shortly receive a LUI number - a Learner Unique Identifier - which is created when the School registers students with the QCAA. Students will use their LUI to access their MyQCE account. MyQCE is a student portal to help students plan their pathway to achieving a QCE and explore further study, training and career options.

QTAC 2023 Course Guide (for current Year 10 students)

The Year 10 Guide: Meeting Prerequisites in 2023 is a guide that helps Year 10 students select senior subjects that will meet prerequisites for tertiary courses starting in 2023. The Year 10 Guide e-book is available at www.qtac.edu.au/about-us/publications. It will be important for students to refer to this guide when they are choosing their Year 11 and 12 subjects, to ensure that will meet university course subject pre-requisites.

Year 9 Career Education

During Term 3, students in Year 9 will complete a short career education program called "Discovering and Exploring Self and Career Interests". The program focuses on helping students develop and drive their career planning, the opportunity to learn about their interests and abilities, and explore potential career options. It will help them to build the confidence to start taking control of their future career pathway and begin to develop a career plan. Students will undertake career education activities during one Form lesson per week using our online Career Tools website. As part of the program, students will develop a Career Action Plan in step with their preferred future.

Vocational Education & Training

2021 TAFE at Schools

The 2021 TAFE at Schools course offerings are now available. Students entering Years 11 or 12 next year may elect to study a Certificate II course on Wednesdays, as part of their senior education and training plan. Applications open on 17 August. A copy of the TAFE at School guide can be downloaded at https://tafeqld.edu.au/courses/ways-you-can-study/tafe-at-school.html?

Apprenticeships and Traineeships

Australian Apprenticeships Pathways provide a range of tools and resources to assist students in researching apprenticeship and traineeship career pathways. As we receive notification of upcoming apprenticeship and traineeship opportunities, these will be posted to the *Years 11 and 12 Careers* Team app. Students are encouraged to regularly check Teams for new announcements and advertisements. It is also recommended that students register online with apprenticeship agencies such as TORGAS and OSMAC, as well as job seeker websites such as seek.com.au. For students interested in applying for an apprenticeship, it is highly recommended that students undertake work experience during the school holidays to gain industry insight.

Scholarships

Various scholarships are available to students interested in study at university or undertaking an apprenticeship. If students are interested in obtaining a study and/or accommodation scholarship, they can refer to the relevant institution's website for details.

Stay up to Date

By regularly checking the Years 11 and 12 Careers group in Teams, students will be able to stay up-to-date with changes to tertiary entrance requirements, course information, scholarships (for university study and apprenticeships), virtual university open days, webinars, apprenticeships and traineeships, and other career-related information.
